THIS MORNING'S ORGAN VOLUNTARY is taken from François Couperin's (1688-1733) *Messe pour les Couvents* (Mass for the Convents), a collection of 21 pieces intended to be played *in alternum* with the sung plainchant of the Mass. This morning's *Récit de Tierce en taille* (Recitative for the 'Tierce' Stop in its tenor range) is among the most vocally inspired of Couperin's organ music. The solemnity of this music reflects its intention to be played during the *Elevation*, the most sublime and holy moment in the Roman Catholic Mass where the consecrated elements were held up so the people could see and contemplate them. François Couperin was the organist of the Church of St. Gervais in Paris and to the Chapel Royal of Louis XIV at Versailles. (Between 1656 and 1826, eight members of the Couperin family served as organists at St. Gervais in an unbroken dynasty lasting 170 years!). François Couperin's output as composer was enormous, but his two Masses constitute his only organ music that has survived.
