



Lee is senior director for Theological Education Funds Development for the Presbyterian Church (USA) and the Presbyterian Foundation, in support of future ministers and our PC(USA) Seminaries. He has served as a campus minister, pastor, and college administrator in Virginia and North Carolina. Lee is active in the theological academy, especially in leadership development.

THE FLOWERS IN THE SANCTUARY TODAY are given by the Bevin Family in loving memory of Priscilla D. Bevin in honor of her birthday on June 5.

THIS MORNING'S ORGAN MUSIC is from the pen of French composer Olivier-Eugène-Prosper-Charles Messiaen (1908-1992). Messiaen entered the Paris Conservatoire at the age of eleven on a fairly traditional course of study with teachers Paul Dukas, Charles-Marie Widor and Marcel Dupré, among others. As he matured, he would develop into a towering figure in 20th Century composition with a highly personal harmonic language noted for its complexity and rich tonal color. While still a student at the Conservatoire, he began an extensive private study of Eastern rhythms, birdsong (transcribing the songs of birds into musical notation), and microtonal music (which utilizes intervals smaller than a half-step). In 1931 he was appointed organist at the Church of the Sainte-Trinité (Holy Trinity) in Paris, a post he would hold for sixtyone years. On the fall of France in 1940, as a French soldier he was taken prisoner and in interned at Görlitz, where he wrote Quatuor pour la fin du temps (Quartet for the End of Time) in 1941 for the only available musical instruments - a piano, violin, cello and clarinet. The work was first performed by Messiaen and fellow prisoners for an audience of 5,000 inmates and prison guards. After the war, Messiaen returned to Paris and resumed teaching, his duties at Sainte-Trinité, and the continuation of composition. From his New York Times obituary: "Messiaen was a prolific and distinctive composer who sought to capture in music both the beauty of the natural world and the spiritual secrets of Roman Catholic mysticism. The style he created in a compositional career that lasted more than six decades drew on everything from bird song-he is said to have quoted the songs of more than 250 species in his works-to Indian and Balinese rhythmic modes, as well as more conventional forms of Western chromaticism and Serial techniques." In this morning's Voluntary, The Celestial Banquet, and Offertory, Eternal Purposes, Messiaen's effective use of extremely slow tempos convey a sense of timelessness and eternity.
