Living Out Our Faith: It's Complicated: Relationship Status and the Church: Throughout the Bible, adult relationships are




complicated. Still today, some people find it difficult to connect with the church whether they are single, married, divorced or widowed.

After the death of his first wife, he felt called back to the church. He married his wife Becky in 1987 and began working at UPC in 1992. Becky and Dennis have two sons together, and now, they have a three-year-old granddaughter whom they adore.

Dennis would like to share with you why he enjoys working at UPC: "In my time here, you all have helped me learn that the church is all about the people. The building is secondary and wouldn't be of any use if you weren't here. It's really been a pleasure to be working with and serving all of you these last 23 years. I have found that I would rather work in the Lord's house than anywhere else."

Local Outreach News: UPC Supports the Orange County Rape Crisis Center

The forty year-old Orange County Rape Crisis Center (OCRCC) is a statewide leader in anti-violence efforts, an advocate for public health and safety, and a place of "Help, Hope, and Healing." This fall, UPC's Local Outreach Committee is giving \$1,000 to support the center's work.

OCRCC supports more than 600 survivors of sexual violence and their loved ones each year with free and confidential services. These services include a 24-hour help line, support group opportunities for female, LGBT and male survivors of rape, therapy referrals and self care skills workshops that incorporate art, meditation and mindfulness. Freedom House is partnering with OCRCC, to help survivors of violence who also are coping with substance abuse.

OCRCC provided 865 Community Education programs to 14,805 adults and youth during its 2013-2014 fiscal year. Sixty-seven percent of the participants were elementary school students. The organization offers education programs in every elementary school in Orange County, including the Chapel Hill Public Schools. OCRCC also responds to requests from private schools. Since 2007, all crisis and education services have been offered in Spanish and English.



OCRCC is a United Way of the Greater Triangle Member Agency of Excellence. The Chapel Hill-Carrboro Chamber of Commerce honored OCRCC with its "Nonprofit of the Year" award in 2013. For more information, please visit http://ocrcc.org/.

Session Digest

At the October meeting of Session, we:

- listened to a devotion by Megan Crunkleton with excerpts from Ruth Haley Barton's book *Sacred Rhythms* about developing spiritual sight, a way of seeing that allows you to find God in all things;
- approved the baptism of William Reese Powell, the son of Meg and Than Powell, on October 11, 2015 and the baptism of Sam Medley, the son of Anna and Chris Medley on November 8, 2015;
- approved the 2016 Communion Schedule, changing some of the services to Intinction;
- reviewed the budget for the building project as presented by Mark Moshier from the Building Committee. After consideration of funding sources, the Session gave approval to the Building Committee to seek quotes from lending institutions for a line of credit to finish the expansion project. The amount needed would depend on how many of the outstanding pledges are received;
- learned the building permits have been received, and as soon as the underground process of moving infrastructure items is finished, the building will proceed;
- received a proposal from the Membership Committee to change called meetings to receive new members from the current busy Sunday morning time to a lunchtime meeting following the 11:00 a.m. service, effective in 2016;
- learned the Global Outreach Committee will be sending \$1000 to Nuhad Tomeh for a dental clinic in Yazdieh on the Syrian coast. Local Outreach will be donating \$5000 to UPPS to help include economically challenged children. This money had originally been earmarked for Operation New Life, which has closed. Following the 2014 Audit, surplus 2014 funds go to Outreach to restore their 2014 budget to its 2013 budget level. The distribution of those additional funds will be decided at the next Outreach Committee meeting;
- received a report on stewardship events and noted that although one half of the 2015 pledges were new or increased, 40 percent of pledges have not changed in the last five years; and
- heard reports from staff on the start of the fall season, with lots of joyful energy throughout the church. The new Kirk Club is going well, along with a Young Adult Bible study. And a new UPC Website will soon be unveiled!
