

SERMON "Discerning the Body" Margaret LaMotte Torrence

(Time is provided following the sermon for a few moments of personal reflection and prayer.)

*Written circa 1960, this creed proclaims the central affirmations of the Christian faith in the idioms of the Maasai, a tribe of semi-nomadic people who live primarily in Kenya and northern Tanzania. As we share these words together, we receive the witness of our African sisters and brothers.*




## Worship Notes

**THIS MORNING'S ORGAN VOLUNTARY:** It has been said that Dietrich Buxtehude (1637-1707) is the greatest German composer that Denmark ever produced. Generally thought to have been born in Helsingborg (then in Denmark, now in Sweden), Buxtehude was, from 1668, organist at the great *Marienkirche* (St. Mary's Church) in Lübeck, Germany. (It was my privilege to visit Lübeck and play the organ at the *Marienkirche* during my 2007 sabbatical.) Buxtehude succeeded Franz Tunder (1614-1667) at St. Mary's on the condition that he marry Tunder's daughter. (As was common at that time, he would also become the church bookkeeper.) From this most prestigious post he became justly famous throughout Europe; he would become the most important organist/composer in the generation before Bach and the 'father' of the North German school of organ playing. In November, 1705, a young 20-year-old Bach hitchhiked 280 miles (then a dangerous journey on foot) from Arnstadt to Lübeck to hear him play. He was so taken with Buxtehude's church music and by their discussions on the arts that he remained in Lübeck until the following February. Upon his return to Arnstadt, he was severely reprimanded by the church council for having overstayed his leave and missing the Advent and Christmas services (!) and for his newfound "improper 'curious' organplaying" which had evidently changed dramatically under Buxtehude's influence. Both George Frideric Handel and J.S. Bach were very interested in succeeding Buxtehude at St. Mary's Church... until they learned that the successful candidate would marry Buxtehude's eldest daughter! This morning we hear Buxtehude's "Jig" Fugue.

**NEW MEMBERS WILL GATHER** in the Fellowship Hall after the 11:00 service today and will be welcomed during worship next Sunday, October 8. We welcome new members every other month. **WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY** is a gift of the Presbyterian Church to the larger ecumenical church. First celebrated at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA in 1933, it was adopted as a denominational practice (by the PCUS) in 1936. Though other denominations were invited to join the celebration from the beginning, it was not until the 1940s that the practice became widespread, as the suffering of WWII exposed the need to witness to Christian unity. Today, World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the world.

**THE PEACEMAKING OFFERING** is received today. Seventy-five percent is used to support the efforts of the Presbyterian Church (USA) to live out a deeper commitment to peacemaking as part of our faithfulness to God. As decided by the Outreach Committee and Session, 25 percent of this year's Peacemaking Offering will go to Orange County Justice United, a non-profit coalition affecting social change for our neighbors in Orange County. Their work is an appropriate match for the generous gifts of this offering. Thank you for your support of an organization that does a great job organizing our local community into a powerful voice for justice and peace in our backyard.

**HAVE YOU PICKED UP YOUR STEWARDSHIP PACKET YET?** Stewardship Committee members have one with your name on it and are waiting for you after church today on the front porch. We ask each member to think, pray, and talk about how we can respond to this great gift of the abundance God has entrusted to us. Stewardship season will culminate on Sunday, October 22, when we gather for Dedication Sunday worship services. We trust with God's power within us, we can accomplish **more than we can imagine!**

**UPC JOINS THE MANY EAGER TO OFFER PRAYERS** and resources to those affected by the recent hurricanes. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance ([pda.pcusa.org](http://pda.pcusa.org)) is our denomination's outstanding emergency response organization, committed to long-term recovery. PDA has been in touch with partners in the midst of the storms to organize relief. Monetary donations are most needed at this time. Because of the congregation's generosity, the church has already sent a generous gift to aid victims of Hurricane Harvey.
