

THIS MORNING'S ORGAN VOLUNTARY is from the pen of German romantic composer Sigfrid Karg-Elert (1877-1933). He spent most of his life in Leipzig and received his musical education at the Conservatory there; he would later join its faculty, teaching music theory and composition. Karg-Elert began his compositional career writing music mostly for the piano at the urging of his mentor Edvard Grieg. In addition to his pursuits at the organ, he became entranced by the *harmonium* (also known as the *reed organ*) and would ultimately compose one of the most significant and extensive catalogues of original works for that instrument. The provincial cultural climate in Germany during the 1920s and 1930s was especially unkind to the worldly Karg-Elert. Although his music was widely admired outside Germany, especially in the UK and the United States, he was branded an *élite* and it was almost completely ignored in his homeland. This led him to try his hand at concertizing, and in 1932 he accepted an invitation to tour America as a concert organist. Alas, his limited skills were no match for the virtuoso performances American audiences had come to expect from the likes of Marcel Dupré, Louis Vierne and others. This, combined with his penchant for solace and confidence of the 80-proof variety, rendered the tour a disaster. Karg-Elert would die the following year from diabetes. This morning we hear his *Chorale-Improvisation on Now Thank We All Our God* (subtitled *Triumphant March*). Although Johann Crüger's famous melody of 1647 is presented in its entirety, it remains mostly hidden amidst rhythmic alterations; yet, the work's energy and rich harmonies project a joyous, even triumphant spirit of thanks and praise.

THE 11:00 CHORAL OFFERING is taken from Johannes Brahms' (1833-1897) *Ein Deutsches Requiem* (A German Requiem). This sacred work, intended for the concert hall rather than the church, was envisioned as "a Requiem for the living" and was possibly inspired by the death of Brahms' mother and even perhaps that of his friend and mentor, Robert Schumann. Brahms forsook the traditional Latin ecclesiastical words and chose the text himself, from the German Luther Bible, and intended that the work be sung in German rather than the usual Latin. The fourth movement, using Psalm 84:1-4, "How lovely is Thy dwelling place, O Lord of Hosts" seems particularly appropriate today as we dedicate our new building.

2018 Stewardship Campaign

After a strong start to the 2018 stewardship campaign, total dollars pledged for next year have fallen behind the pace of each of the previous three years' campaigns. As of November 15, just over three weeks after Dedication Sunday, pledges for 2018 totaled \$1,409,689, down 7% from the \$1,516,578 pledged by the same point last year. We have 316 pledges for 2018, also down 7% from 339 at the same point last year.
