

MATT MOORMAN IS OUR UPC ministerial intern, who is spending much of his time with PCM. Matt is in his fourth year at Union Presbyterian Seminary in Charlotte. We look forward to Matt preaching on Sunday, April 29.

THE REV. DR. NUHAD TOMEH, a native of Syria, served as a Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Mission co-worker in Beirut, and as the PC(USA)'s regional liaison to Syria, Lebanon, Iraq, and the Gulf. He also served as Associate General Secretary for the Middle East Council of Churches. Since retiring to Tucson, he has continued to work with churches in Lebanon and Syria, and serves as the Middle East Mission Consultant for the Outreach Foundation. He has been a mission partner of UPC for more than ten years. We are grateful to have Dr. Tomeh worshipping with us this morning.

THIS MORNING'S MUSIC hails from the pens of two English composers. The Organ Voluntary was composed by Charles Wesley Jr. (1757-1834), the eldest surviving child of Charles Wesley, a leader in the English Methodist movement and composer of more than 6,000 hymns, and his wife Sarah. His *Pastorale* was written for keyboard alone, as was typical of the period, since the organ pedalboard had yet to be introduced in England. Charles Jr., a child prodigy who was playing the organ before the age of three, would spend most of his career as the private organist to the English Royal Family. Thomas Morley (ca. 1557-1602) lived in London at the same time as William Shakespeare, although a connection between the two has never been proven. By 1591 he was the organist of St. Paul's Cathedral, and in 1592 he was sworn in as a gentleman of the Chapel Royal. Although it is highly probable that Morley converted to Roman Catholicism early in life, perhaps under the influence of his mentor, composer William Byrd, he eventually defected from that church and engaged in espionage work among the English Roman Catholics in the Netherlands. This morning's 11:00 Offertory offers his *Agnus Dei*, a stand-alone composition which is not part of a larger Mass setting.
