

THIS MORNING'S MUSIC celebrates the great Festival of Easter. The Organ Voluntary is taken from Jean Langlais' (1907-1991) *Trois Paraphrases Grégoriennes* (Three Gregorian Paraphrases), a collection composed between 1934 and 1935 and one of his earliest works of real maturity in his extraordinary harmonic language. Langlais prefaces *Mors and Resurrectio* (Death and Resurrection) with the words of Saint Paul to the Corinthians, "Death where is thy victory?" The work is based on two themes, the first of which is Langlais' own invention, which represents death, and the second, based on the *Introit from the Mass of the Dead*, which represents life. Langlais develops and ultimately combines these two themes to an all-engulfing climax. It is worth noting that if Langlais had not lost his sight at the age of two, he may well have followed his father into the family trade of stonecutting. (It was my privilege to be invited into the organ loft of St. Clothilde to meet Jean Langlais and watch him play a Mass during my first trip to Paris in 1974.) This morning's Offertory Anthem is from the pen of Edward C. Bairstow (1874-1946), organist of York Minster in England for thirty-three years from 1911 until his death. Notorious for his brusque manner, he astonished the musical and ecclesiastical establishment by refusing the invitation from Westminster Abbey to become its music director. *Sing Ye to the Lord* is one of the beloved Easter anthems in the choral repertoire. George Frideric Handel's (1685-1759) mighty *Hallelujah Chorus* was first heard 277 years ago this coming Sunday, April 8, in 1742, when the oratorio *Messiah* was premiered in Dublin. The occasion was a concert presented to raise funds in response to the great Irish famine of 1741. Handel would continue this tradition until the end of his life by presenting annual performances of *Messiah* in London and donating the proceeds to charity.
