PREPARATION FOR WORSHIP

“Hope is...not the same as joy that things are going well, or a willingness to invest in enterprises that are obviously headed for early success, but rather, an ability to work for something because it is good, not just because it stands a chance to succeed. The more unpropitious the situation in which we demonstrate hope, the deeper that hope is. Hope is definitely not the same thing as optimism. 

THE ORGAN VOLUNTARY was composed by famous French organist Jean Langlais (1907-1991), a student of Marcel Dupré and organist at the Basilica of St. Clotilde in Paris, a post once held by César Franck. Langlais, who was blind at birth, was encouraged to pursue the organ, as were many blind musicians in France; Louis Vierne, the celebrated organist of the Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris, was another. A career as an organist was thought to be ideal as it was something that blind persons could do effectively on their own, without help or guidance. Indeed, even today one of the four organists at the Cathedral of Notre Dame is without sight. Jean Langlais developed himself into one of the premier concert organists and composers of the second half of the twentieth century and developed a remarkable and unique harmonic language. *Chant de paix* (Song of Peace) is a simple and elegant example of his luxurious and evocative style. It was my distinct privilege to meet Jean Langlais and be in the organ loft at St. Clotilde as he played a Sunday mass during my first trip to Paris in 1974. J.S. Bach's (1685-1750) *Das alte Jahr vergangen ist* (The old year has passed away), heard during the 8:30 Offering, is fitting as we enter a new Liturgical Year this morning.

2019 Stewardship Campaign

The organ rumbling to a halt during the 11:00 service last week reminded us of all the things our church budget must stretch to cover. Luckily, the organ had an inexpensive quick fix, but not all facility repairs are resolved so easily. Last year, in addition to making targeted budget cuts and drawing \$40,000 from our reserve fund to meet our known costs, we had \$15,000 more in unplanned expenses. We need a budget that does not require us to draw from our savings. UPC's budget is determined by our pledges. So far this year, the amount pledged is significantly less than at this point last year. Together, we can bear fruit that will last.

We need a total of 3,020 diapers (420 size 4; 1,220 size 5; and 1380 size 6). We will deliver the diapers to RSC in January for February distribution.
