


Report of the Pastor Nominating Committee



About Jarrett & Meg

Meg and Jarrett are both natives of North Carolina. They both attended UNC and met in the hallways of UPC as members of our Presbyterian Campus Ministry. After college, Jarrett served as a youth minister for one year and then spent another year traveling, spending a great

deal of time in Port-au-Prince, Haiti living in community with disabled children at **Wings of Hope**.



They graduated with Master's degrees both in Divinity (MDiv) and in Christian Education (MACE) from Union Presbyterian Seminary in Richmond, VA. After seminary, Meg spent a year as a non-ordained Pastoral Assistant at Southminister Presbyterian Church in Chesterfield, VA, a suburban congregation of 500.

They were both ordained as Ministers of Word and Sacrament at Village Presbyterian Church in Prairie Village, KS where they served for seven years. Village Presbyterian is a suburban congregation of 4,800 near Kansas City. Meg served as the Associate Pastor for Pastoral Care, supervised two administrators — a Respite Care director and a staff therapist — and served as Staff Liaison to the Presbyterian Women. Jarrett served as the Associate Pastor for Mission and Young Adult Ministry, supervised the Director of International Mission and the Director of Community Food Pantry, and served as Staff Liaison to Front Porch Alliance (a community non-profit and church mission).

Since June of 2013, Jarrett and Meg have served as co-pastor Heads of Staff at **Burke Presbyterian Church** in the suburbs of Washington DC. Together, they are partnering to serve this suburban congregation of 650 and supervise six program staff.

In addition to their many other educational and service activities, Meg and Jarrett participate in **The Well**, a lectionary-based, annual study group of seventeen pastors. This group, in



which they have participated since 2007, also nourishes other pastors who are well known at UPC.

Meg and Jarrett have three young daughters: big sister **Naomi** (7) and, twins, **Caroline** and **Zanna** (5). This past spring, Jarrett finally convinced his daughters that college basketball is fun and cheering for the Tar Heels is way more fun than anything involving princesses or unicorns. They are both thrilled to return home.



MEG

Meg Peery McLaughlin feels called to share good Gospel news—in word, in deed, in silence, in all things—to all of God's beloved children.

Meg has been described as one of the best young preachers in the denomination. Meg also excels at making vision reality by mobilizing and creating a game plan to get the church moving. Jarrett says she can listen to stories all day and cares deeply about the people she shepherds and serves.

She has hitched her life to the promise that Jesus Christ is the light that overcomes darkness, is the love that is stronger than all fear, and is the sure and certain assurance that new life is possible, even when it seems otherwise.

"Meg comes from a family of PC(USA) preachers, so you could say that ministry is in her blood! However, Meg would tell you that she chose this journey on her own, due to a deep sense of call to serve. Meg is passionate and caring—simply amazing with her pastoral care. Meg's Statement of Faith

I believe in God, whom Jesus called Abba, Father,

whom scripture testifies to as a mother who gathers her children under her wing; this is the loving parent to whom all of life belongs and in whom all of creation finds its origin and finds itself good.

God is a mystery beyond our greatest attempts to parse and explain, and is at the same time as close to us as our own breath.

In that intimacy, God calls humankind into relationship

- with God, with one another, and with all of creation.

These relationships are to be characterized by love, undergirded by justice, and lived out authentically; and yet, all too often they are fractured by failures, polluted with greed, and broken by hurt.

But God refuses to let go. We are included in relationship not because of our own efforts, but by God's grace alone.

This unrelenting and redeeming love of God is fully disclosed in Jesus Christ:

through his life and ministry, his death and resurrection.

Jesus enters into the vulnerability of human life, companions us in the chaos, and shines light that no darkness can overcome.

His life-altering teaching, radical hospitality, and constant call to discipleship consistently challenges us today as we seek to live as those who call Christ "Lord;" and during his day, his gospel threatened those that thought they were Lord, leading to Christ's crucifixion.

On the third day, angels spoke words beside Jesus' empty tomb, proclaiming to us all, that in the midst of our own hopelessness and in the shadow of the grave: we need not be afraid.

God's Spirit works faith in us to help us trust the truth of the Gospel:

that life is stronger than death,

that we are never, ever alone,

that grace is new every morning, as sure as the sunrise,

that hope is risky, yes; but hope does not disappoint,

that God's promised day is coming and we can joyfully and fearlessly work for it.

That Spirit gathers the Church to do just that,

as we enact and embody the divine command to love God and neighbor by being sent out to be the body of Christ in and for the world.

The Spirit is at work in the sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper,

both reminding us of God's grace and imparting it to us.

The Spirit inspires the Scriptures of the New and Old Testament,

God's Word through human documents which guide and equip the Church.

To this God we belong in life and in death. To this God be all honor, glory and praise.

JARRETT

Jarrett McLaughlin has a deep passion for the Church as a place of radical welcome and hospitality and tries his best every day to honor the ways he has experienced that in his own life as grace upon grace.

Jarrett has been described as one of the best young visionaries in the denomination. He likes to look at the big picture, ask questions of purpose, and enable the community to articulate vision. He is full of energy, has a great sense of humor, loves working with youth and is described by Meg as an intellectual who loves diving into theology.

When not engaged at Church, Jarrett enjoys running and hiking. He is also an obsessive music fan intent on keeping up with independent music of all kinds — reading blogs and record reviews, scoping out live shows, and constantly spinning tunes in the car, home or office.

From Meg & Jarrett

Dear Friends of University Church,

In the weeks since the Pastor Nominating Committee extended the call to be the co-pastors of University Presbyterian Church, we have not been able to get Charles Kuralt's voice out of our heads: "What is it that binds us to this place as to no other?"

UPC looms large in both of our stories. Week after week, we both gathered in the PCM student center to eat a home-cooked meal and find a place to belong, a place to believe, and a place to become. Sunday nights, Jarrett could be found in the Youth Center where the youth and other adult leaders made space for him to explore a fledgling call to ministry. Most Sunday mornings he perched in the second-to-last row of the balcony for worship. There was something about this church that enticed both of us to become involved in the church community. We must confess that this shared history indeed binds us to this place.

But with all due respect to Charles Kuralt, we believe there is a more interesting question at play: what is it that <u>calls</u> us to this place as to no other? It is not the sign out front announcing the preacher and sermon title. It is not the whiteboard in the office that causes worshippers to pause and pray for a friend. It is not the magnolia tree that lifts climbing children in her arms. It is not Vance Barron or Bob Dunham, though their fingerprints are all over the church's ministry. No, our call to this place is the clear sense that God is still stretching and shaping UPC in fresh ways.

The Church — any church, every church — is always becoming. The UPC we knew twenty years ago is not the same as the UPC that exists today. We cannot wait to discover that church. The UPC of today is not the same as it will be twenty years from now. We are energized to be a part of that journey. The Spirit of God stretches the Church, and thus all of us, in so many beautiful and unexpected ways. Our love for the Church — any church and particularly University Presbyterian Church — is based on the fact that it is, as it was meant to be, the Church of Jesus Christ.

IN THEIR WORDS

We spent a lot of time sorting through the Personal Information Forms (PIFs) from our applicants. These are some of Meg's & Jarrett's words that stood out to us.

Meg:

"How can we worship the one who fled his birthplace as a refugee and not consider conversations about immigration? How can we follow the one who said 'blessed are the poor' without examining class and race and distribution of wealth? The point is not that we agree, but that the church is willing to engage in conversations that matter, and then take the fruit of those conversations into the world."

Meg & Jarrett:

"Well, first we would love them."

Responding to our question, "What are two or three ways in which you would support and challenge our staff?"

Jarrett:

"It's probably ill-advised to lead off the narrative portion of one's PIF referencing the present political environment, but I will say this has been an interesting time to lead in the Church. I say this with no assumption that the PNC reading this is of the same mind politically. Frankly, political homogeneity is the last thing that the Church needs right now. Faith communities may be one of the final frontiers of ideological diversity in these increasingly polarized times."

Jarrett:

"UPC taught me the value of having difficult conversations, and trusting that the center will hold even when there is tension."

Meg:

"Much of ministry is *going with the Christians* you got and imperfectly together plodding toward God's perfect love."

Jarrett:

"No matter the size of the Church, community is not only possible, but essential."

Meg:

"At a recent workshop on 'Cultivated Ministry' I was given words that helped me articulate another of my ecclesial convictions—that of the church being an 'input.' I have long trusted that the church does not exist for itself; it is indeed an exhibition of the kingdom of heaven for the world. Its job is to point to something bigger and work joyfully for it. As such, the church is the input in the growing process, not the output. The result is God's kingdom."

PNC REFLECTIONS


We read applications, listened to countless sermons, and conducted interviews, among other activities. Here are some of our thoughts on Meg and Jarrett.

"When I think back over the PNC's many deliberations from last August until now, I can't envision a better outcome."

Brian Curran:

Mary Ellen Olson:

"I was a UPC member when Meg and Jarrett were students at UNC and participating here in our campus ministry program. Jarrett was a youth advisor with our youth program at the time. Our older son, now 38, was in the youth group then. When I met Jarrett in person last month, he immediately asked if I was lan's mom and how was he doing. And he asked about many of the other youth in the group at that time. There is something special about the connection Meg and Jarrett have to this place. It feels very organic and natural for them to return here and continue the story of UPC."

"When the Mission Study Team asked us at PYC to tell them what we saw when we envisioned UPC's next pastor, my mind drew a blank. I wasn't able to picture anyone but Bob in our pulpit until we got the applications from Jarrett and Meg. I wasn't incredibly excited to have to leave my semester school in June, but now I am counting down the days until I get to come home and welcome the McLaughlins to our church family!"

CO-PASTOR MODEL

We know that you may be entertaining the thought of a clergy couple for the first time, and that a co-pastor model would be a new pattern of ministry for UPC. We have a vision of how that works—and how well it works—where the Jarrett & Meg serve presently.

Meg & Jarrett on serving together in partnership:

"Nobody does ministry in isolation, but rather in community. We believe that the Co-Pastor model communicates this from the start. Even among leadership, there is a balance of power, perspective and a diversity of gifts. We share a passion for preaching and leading worship, but do so with different styles. In our experience,

our congregations have benefited from hearing different voices in the pulpit. Similarly, we offer distinct leadership styles. We truly value one another's gifts and the ways we complement one another. We find joy in working together. This also allows our whole family to experience church together."

How can UPC fill a single position with two pastors?

In its wisdom, our session has maintained both our senior and associate pastor positions as interim positions. Calling Meg and Jarrett as co-pastor heads of staff will fill both positions. Thus, UPC will not need to search for and call an installed associate pastor.

How will they share responsibilities and divide the work?

Jarrett and Meg will equally share the privilege of preaching and worship as well as moderating session. Beyond that, it makes sense to have a clear division so that the congregation knows "who to go to with what." At Burke, they divide the Session Committees and staff supervision clearly. Likewise, they will broadcast in as many ways as possible who is responsible for different areas of the life of UPC.

What if some people like one of them better than the other?

Meg and Jarrett have assured us that this will surely happen! Humans are beautifully singular—we each have personalities and idiosyncrasies that endear us to different people. From what we've seen at their current church, this is a strength!

Will they go on vacation at the same time?


Yes, they will. As it is for so many of us, that is important family time for Jarrett & Meg. They are also in an annual study/preaching cohort called The Well. Together with the Session, they will make sure that all bases were covered appropriately.

Who's going to get the big desk?

When you hear Co-Pastor Heads of Staff, we know what one of your first questions will be. To eliminate the suspense, Meg will take that office...mostly because she keeps a cleaner desk.

OUR PROCESS

The journey that led us to Meg and Jarrett began 2 years ago when the Transition Team worked to bring us our interim Margaret LaMotte Torrence; then continued through the introspective work of our Mission Study, and finally to the election of the PNC and its work in searching for a new pastor head of staff. Details of this process are described below.



As with all things Presbyterian, we have been following a prescribed and well-ordered process. The congregation elected us to serve as the 9-member PNC at the Congregational Meeting on July 22, 2018.

We were charged and trained by Ted Churn, Executive Presbyter of the Presbytery of New Hope, on August 29, 2018. We have met weekly since that date. We used the congregation's opinions as to the characteristics and qualities sought in our next pastor (shared in the first half of 2018 during our mission study) to produce our Ministry Information Form (MIF).

Our MIF was approved by the session on October 18, 2018, and then by the presbytery's Commission on Ministry on October 22, 2018.

PROCESS (continued)

The PNC spent more than 6 months sorting through application materials, listening to sermons, conducting interviews, visiting websites, and trying to put together the puzzle of whom God was calling to be the next pastor and head of staff at UPC.

We deliberated over the applications of over 100 pastors, including many received through the Church Leadership Connection (PC(USA)'s national database).

We contacted 15 leading pastors, seminary presidents, and thought leaders from the larger church who recommended more than 30 additional pastors.

We reviewed applications using a rigorous three-stage process. As we reviewed applications and listened to sermons, we prayed continuously for God's guidance, referring frequently to our Ministry Information Form, while considering a number of distinctive qualifications and prior experiences.

Our search process ultimately led to video teleconference interviews, discreet visits to candidates' churches, and face-to-face interviews with candidates that included tours of UPC and our community and meals with all members of the PNC.

In early May, we notified the Reverend
Jarrett McLaughlin and the Reverend Meg
Peery McLaughlin of our desire to issue a
call. We also shared the proposed terms of
the call, which include a compensation
package.

Once we reached an agreement with the McLaughlins, we arranged an interview with presbytery's Examinations & Transfers Sub-Commission. Seven members of the PNC were also examined at that time.

Once presbytery approved the call and gave its final clearance, we revealed the approval to the session, and asked them to call a congregational meeting on May 19, 2019, to elect our new pastors.
