This week someone came into my office with some really good suggestions about how to lead in this place. I am always glad to hear such (and, in fact, encourage you to reach out with hopes and dreams that you have for this church!). The things this person suggested were all really worthwhile. I wanted to act immediately. And I also know that part of my role right now is to listen and learn and watch and see. Every week is a new week of tension between action and listening, of seeing around the bend good, hard work that is to be done. Someone said to me last week, "Adulthood is saying, 'After this week, it will slow down' over and over, until you die." That's a pretty dire message—and of course, it was said in jest—but it did make me yearn for some peace and quiet.

And there are moments during this season where we feel it, do we not? Maybe not in the hustle and bustle of the shopping, cooking, in-laws, or children bouncing off the walls. But rather, early in the morning when the sun isn't up and you have your coffee and turn on the lights of the tree. Or that moment on Christmas Eve when we've sung the final words to *Silent Night*; the candles are aglow, and the pastor hasn't opened her mouth yet. And it really does feel like all is calm, all is bright.

Peace and quiet. I did a little research on that phrase to which I've been clinging, and I learned that it was in a letter to Jonathan Swift in 1730 that the word peace first was connected to quiet. It's the freedom from any external disturbance, as the Oxford English Dictionary puts it. In a few weeks, we will light the Advent candle of peace, but the truth is, it is so loud out there.

Gun fire in schools. Impeachment Trials. Arguing about climate change and everything else under the hot sun. Work calling to us around every bend. It is so loud out there. Nobody is free from external disturbance.

Every year, John the Baptist shows up in Advent, standing between us and that beautiful moment of Silent Night. He's the forerunner to Jesus, the one who prepares the way. And when Luke introduces him, he does it this way: In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor, and Herod was ruler, and his brother Philip ruler, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, and Annas and Caiaphas were priests, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness.

Some scholars say that the point of all this introduction is that the Word of God comes not to the big names, but to the no-name John in the wilderness. We shouldn't be surprised by that; after all, God shows up in a backyard shed, born to an unwed teenager mother in the middle of nowhere. But if I understand it, I think all this introduction is to show how loud it was back then, too.

The word of God came in the fifteenth year of a reign that wasn't God's, in the year of these particular fellows setting the agendas and making the rules; in the time of crippling taxes and massive discriminations. Tiberius and Herod and Philip were known for corruption and brutality. And in the midst of all of that: word of peace, the word of God, promise of new life still came.

God didn't wait until all was well, until the people had sunk into the couch and breathed in the quiet and opened our arms for God's coming. God's word of peace, God's promise of life, came in the chaos of the real world.

So, this Advent, amid all the good work there is to do, amid the loudness of the word, I will remember with you that God's peace does not require quiet. It will come no matter what.



#### **Lessons & Carols**

When Jim and Laura Baxley and their children, an infant and a toddler at the time, were church-shopping in 2004, they happened to come to UPC on the third Sunday in December, which happened to be the traditional Advent service of Lessons and Carols.

Jim had grown up in a church with music leadership that included a similar worship service every year, and as the music and liturgy unfolded and enveloped the family, he knew he had found his new church home. He and Laura not only joined the church, but Jim joined the choir and has been performing in the special Advent service ever since.

"Music for me is a way to worship that is different than other ways: prayer, sermon and liturgy," he said. "Music lets me express and give glory in a way that's personal but also shared."

The Lessons and Carols service, held during both the 8:30 and 11 a.m. services on the third Sunday in Advent at UPC, tells the Christmas story through Scripture, which doesn't vary much from year to year, and music, which does, given the many wonderful Advent carols by different composers and in different arrangements. The Word and music are intertwined; the carols illustrating and amplifying the Advent message of hope, peace, joy and love.



The service of Lessons and Carols has become so much a part of the Baxley family Christmas that this year, after the family had booked — and paid for — a winter vacation, then realized it meant being away during the third Sunday in Advent, Jim went to no small amount of effort and expense to rebook the trip so they would be at UPC for Lessons and Carols. Christmas is not complete without it.

All choirs participate, from the youngest, Children's Choir, to the adult Chancel Choir. The special music gives church members of all ages the opportunity to work together as a team, learning and rehearsing the music and perfecting their performance.

"If the music program didn't exist, it would be a loss not just for worship but for those participating in it," Jim said.

Your pledge to UPC makes it possible for our church to produce this important ministry.

Music director Tom Brown selects the carols each year based in part on the voices and instrumentalists available. Often the service will include a trumpeter, harpist and violinist. And, of course, the choirs.

Pledges fund the music budget, which covers sheet music, organ maintenance and "keeping Tom, who is part of the magic," Jim said. "Tom is a world-class musician, a talent who can write, conduct and arrange music, and play the organ and piano, and do it all.



#### Coming in 2020



# Presbyterian Women Service Project Diaper Collection for Refugee Support Center (RSC)

The Presbyterian Women (PW) will collect diapers for the Refugee Support Center (RSC) beginning Sunday, November 24 through Sunday, December 29. Refugee families do not have access to other diaper distribution services, only the RSC service, so local groups are helping meet this need in our community.

#### We invite our UPC congregation to help support this outreach ministry in two ways:

- 1. Place diapers you purchase in boxes in the Church Parlor or Church Office. Please note that only size 6 diapers are needed from the UPC congregation. (Women from Circles 1-5 will provide diapers in other sizes.)
- 2. You may write a check to UPC, designate in the memo line "Diaper project" or "diapers for RSC." Money collected will be used to buy diapers for the Center.

We need 1680 diapers in size 6. We will collect 3000 diapers, total, which will benefit 50 families. PW will deliver the diapers to RSC in January for February distribution. Thank you for supporting this project. Questions? Contact Vicki Lotz at vilotz@live.unc.edu.

#### **UPC Endowment Disbursements**

The Endowment Committee makes recommendations to the Session for the distribution of unrestricted endowment funds two times a year – in the spring and again in the fall. At its November meeting, the Session approved the Committee's recommendations to fund the following proposals:

- 1. \$5,000 toward the second of three \$10,000 annual commitments to IFC's capital campaign to build the IFC Food-First Building;
- 2. \$9,725 for equipment upgrading at the Dispute Settlement Center;
- 3. \$1,000 for the 50th anniversary capital campaign for Presbyterian Association of Musicians;
- 4. \$1,875 for a new laminating machine for University Presbyterian Preschool.



## **Session Digest**

At its November meeting, the session received the Fall 2019 recommendation of the Endowment Committee. The committee received proposals for funding from the IFC's capital campaign to build the IFC Food-First Building, Dispute Settlement Center, Presbyterian Association of Musicians and University Presbyterian Preschool. All requests received some level of funding with the available funds of \$17,600. The committee noted that the recommendation is responsive to both the internal needs of UPC (11% of the allocation) and responds to the proposals in the faith community beyond UPC (89% of the allocation).

As a commissioner representative of the session at the October 26 Presbytery of New Hope meeting, Elder Dave Moreau reported that Co-Pastors Meg Peery McLaughlin and Jarrett McLaughlin were joyfully welcomed into the presbytery at this gathering in Smithfield, NC.

The Earth Care Team reported that after September Second Sunday Lunch, 82 pounds of trash was collected and sent to the landfill. In October, the Earth Care Team collected 56 pounds of compostable plates, cups, utensils, napkins, and food waste at Second Sunday Lunch, leaving only two pounds of lunch trash for the dumpster and landfill.

Meg also introduced a project for the purpose of inviting folks back to worship. The staff had already gone through the directory to mark people they have not seen in the months since Meg and Jarrett started. The list of will be shared with the Elders who can refine the list if they have seen folks on there attending worship. Then Elders would be asked to invite folks on the list to come back to worship and express why this new chapter in the life of UPC is vital and energizing.

#### The Star of Bethlehem

Here is a Bible trivia question for you: What book of the Bible has the account of the Bethlehem star? Luke, Acts, Isaiah, Matthew, John, Micah? No peeking or Googling! The answer is at the end of this article.

I was fascinated by a video entitled, The Star of Bethlehem, by Rick Larson. The whole scenario surrounding the Magi and the star is mind-boggling to say the least. In the interest of time and space, I can't elaborate on the video except to say that the knowledge I gained is simple: our God's universe has no walls and His miracles are performed to carry out His will. The star that led the Magi from the East, reappeared after their visit to King Herod. It then led them south to Bethlehem where they worshipped the child and brought gifts of gold, incense and myrrh. It is interesting to note that stars, i.e., planets, travel from east to west—not north to south. Also, as you walk under the heavens, the stars move. This one remained in place.

Where are you traveling this Christmas season? What kind of gifts are you expecting? Is your journey filled with expectancy? Are you heading in the direction of joy, peace and love? Are the gift boxes filled with happy memories? Who is coming to visit you?

This season can have many destinations. Some ending with a smiling face, some ending with a joyful reunion, some ending in the simple enjoyment of home and family and some beginning with a new awe of what this season is all about.




