Speaking of music, I am also looking forward to watching our youth present their Musical Showcase. I understand that this is a different format than previous years, but all the same I enjoy hearing young people sing, knowing that we sing our way to faith long before we think our way into believing. They will be presenting songs from Children of Eden, immersing us in the story of creation and reminding us all of the simple truth that we are each fashioned in the image of God.

Recently, the same clergy group that organized the interfaith sing-a-long met with Dr. Pamela Baldwin, Superintendent of the Chapel Hill-Carrboro schools. We had an intriguing conversation about the achievement gap in our schools and how the faith community might partner with local schools to help address that reality that I know is important to many of you in the congregation. I look forward to continuing that conversation in 2020.

I also met with the Earth Care Team recently and learned about a wonderful series of classes they are hosting in January, including presentations about Church-wide composting campaigns with "The Trashy Women" of Binkley Baptist Church, Environmental and Climate Justice for the Poor and Marginalized with William Barber III and a session about the PCUSA's endorsement of carbon pricing with Bill Bray, a Presbyterian Elder and retired Exxon Executive.

I am energized by the intergenerational interest in UPC's witness on behalf of ecological justice and hope you will consider tuning in to their work in 2020.

With all of this going on, it will be spring flowers and on into endless summer days before I know it. Winter will never be my favorite season, but I am grateful for this church community that pursues the Gospel no matter the season. I am grateful to be in ministry among you.

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

Stewardship R.O.I. Men's Breakfast Group

Judging from the program topics presented at UPC's Men's Breakfast Group over the past few years, you'd be hard-pressed to find a common theme or define a "type" drawn to the early-morning gathering.

Jack Benjamin, who coordinates the group, reeled off some of the presentations in recent months: Works of art that moved us; recognizing and overcoming burnout; the developmental stages of retirement; the opioid epidemic; water; and the Bible. One man shared his experience of visiting Masada, the site of King Herod's palace and the first Jewish-Roman war in the first century. Another man talked about overcoming his addiction years ago. Once the topic was a Thomas Merton book. Another time it was Frederick Buechner's concept of sacred journey. At one breakfast, a photographer talked about experiencing God's grace through art. In January, a presenter will talk about ethics in finance.

"Each of us chooses something we really care about," Jack said. "We've gotten to know one another. That's the reason we all keep coming back, regardless of the topic."

The men gather at 7 a.m. in the Terrace Room at the church on the first and third Mondays of the month, from mid-September through mid-June. John Rogers cooks breakfast, often assisted by John Falletta, Jim Snapper, Ben Urick, and others. The first half hour is devoted to sharing the meal; the presentation and discussion last another half hour. The gathering ends at 8 a.m. sharp.

"The parking police begin ticketing after 8 o'clock," Jack said, "so everyone is anxious to go. Program's over; see you next time."

Your pledge to UPC makes it possible for our church to provide this important ministry. The men donate \$5 each to help defray the costs of breakfast, and the Adult Education budget ensures that all expenses are covered.

A couple dozen men come to the breakfasts routinely. Nate Haines first checked out the group when he and his family were new to the church and he hadn't yet met many people. Getting to know the other men in the breakfast group made him feel better connected to people in the Sunday morning worship services.

"There's a small contingent of us without gray hair at the breakfast," Nate said. "I enjoy connecting with them and with the men who aren't in my age range. It's a healthy reminder that life moves on and that most of the hardships of professional life quickly fade."

John Rogers contributes thoughtful leadership in nudging participants to present their topics in some relationship to faith. "The ensuing discussions have been fascinating," said Jack.

"The topics are fairly personal, and people talk about different meaningful parts of their lives," he said. "It's always interactive, and there's always lots of laughter."

"We're getting to be really good friends."


Join the "Trashy Women" in Vance Barron Hall for this informative and engaging presentation!

erful and pressing themes that N. T. Wright addresses in this book that is at once timely and timeless.



Paris to Pittsburgh Documentary Screening (FREE)


