### Pastor's Message

Dear UPC Saints,

This week, in preparation for UPC's Zoom staff meeting, I looked up the daily lectionary. Often, the Psalm reading can serve as a meaningful morning prayer. (I recommend it if you've never tried such.) Well, the Psalm for this Tuesday was Psalm 15, and for whatever reason, my internet browser pulled up the NIV version, though I prefer the NRSV. Psalm 15 begins with a question: "Lord, who may dwell in your sacred tent?" Then the Psalmist goes on to say "the one who does what is righteous, who speaks truth from the heart, who does no wrong to a neighbor." Yes, okay, of course this is the company God wants to keep. Me, too!

But then, I got to the part where the Psalmist says the one who will never be shaken is "the one who does not change their mind." And that's when I wanted to cry.

Because Delta.

Because we do feel shaken.

Because just this week we have changed the plan (again):

- Children's Fall Sunday School was going to be inside in classes, now it's outside with stations.
- We'd hoped to go "back to two services" on 9/19, but now need to wait to see how school goes, and will shift to an 11am service on 10/3 and see if we need to add an 8:30am service or not.
- Fall Youth Trips are on hold.
- We had a whole "Comeback from COVID" sermon series planned, which now just feels foolish.

I know we are not alone. Your own businesses, organizations, schools, and families are all in the same boat as we change course to keep each other safe. Even if we're tired of it, it's part of how we live out our Christian ethic to love God and neighbor.

So, I went back to that Psalm, hopeful that all this flexibility would *somehow, someway* still have a place. Please, let this not be in vain, I prayed.

And here's the thing. If we read the NRSV of the same text, we'll find that the one who is not shaken, the one who dwells with God, is the one who stands by their oath <u>even to their hurt</u>." Even to their hurt. So maybe our frustrated tears are actually holy.

If I understand it, those who seek God's company are those who figure out ways to stand by their promises, their word, in all circumstances, even when those circumstances change and they have to alter their plans to make it all work.

UPC, you have said your central act as God's people is worship. So, we'll continue to do that—online and in the sanctuary at whatever time is best (though that time may change—pay attention!).

UPC, you have made baptismal promises to children. So, we'll continue to adapt to new ways of teaching them that they belong to God.

UPC, you have made it abundantly clear that your neighbors matter. So, we'll continue to meet new friends in small groups and reach out in service to this community and globe through your gifts of time, talent and treasure.

We'll be changing our minds and changing our plans and changing our patterns, even to our hurt, in order that we can steadfastly be who God has called us to be.

# Fall 2021 - An Update

In response to the Delta variant and current COVID trends, we are continuing to re-evaluate and adjust our plans for the fall. We are not rewinding our timeline, but we are shifting and hitting pause on a few things. There are some details we are still figuring out as we watch the trends and discern together what is best, particularly for the most vulnerable among us. Here is what we know so far:



#### Worship

We will continue to worship! At this point, our plan is to continue with one service at 10 am through the end of September. We will not have communion in September (to allow us to keep our masks on during worship). We will reassess this plan after September 19.

Schedule note: on Sunday, September 12, we will be at New Hope Camp & Conference Center for the congregational retreat and will worship together there. We will prerecord a worship service and post it online that morning for those who prefer a virtual option.



#### Children's & Youth Ministries & Music

For now, we are planning to begin youth group and children's, junior, and youth choirs outdoors with masks on Sunday, Sept 19. We expect to begin Sunday School and Confirmation on Sunday, October 3. We are listening to input from parents and watching data on the Delta variant to determine how best to provide safe and engaging faith formation for our young people this fall. #### **Coffee Talk with the Pastors**



### Meet our Choral Scholars

In August, the music ministry at UPC inaugurated a new Choral Scholars Program as we welcomed three new UNC students to our chancel choir. For those unfamiliar with the term "choral scholar," think along the lines of a college student sacred music intern who serves as a section leader in the choir. This is no new invention on our part--the concept of having choral scholars to help lead worship has its origins in the collegiate chapels of England, and the tradition has since been adopted by churches across America. While choral scholars are traditionally voice majors, they may or may not have experience singing in a church setting. In addition to contributing their vocal leadership to our choir, they also have the opportunity to explore repertoire from the sacred canon in a liturgical context while growing other aspects of their musicianship. For their commitment to the church, a modest stipend is awarded to each choral scholar for their continued musical education. My hope is that this is the start of a more robust collaborative partnership between our church and the musical talent and energy in our university community. ## First Steps in Music



# Kathleen Jasinskas Director of Youth & Children's Choirs

This August, I traveled to Slippery Rock, PA to become certified in John Fierabend's First Steps In Music program. This curriculum primarily targets our youngest singers, from birth to about 1st grade, focusing on the importance of communal singing and the development of tuneful, beatful (yup, that's a word!), and artful little ones. We used some of the sacred music from this collection at VBS this year, and I was so excited to see the kids light up working on it.

First Steps has been around since the late '90s. It has always intrigued me as an educator, but the thing that drew me to it particularly at this time was how they have reacted to the movement to remove racist music from the elementary classroom. You might be surprised to know how many songs that were familiar to us as children carry a racist message, sometimes below the surface, and often right on their face. When this came to light several years ago, many educators chose to bury their heads in the sand - "Good music is good music! These songs have been around forever!" - they cried.

First Steps went the opposite direction. They hired a team of educators of color, and replaced objectionable songs in the curriculum with repertoire that is equally intriguing and educational without promoting systemic racism. They were up front in confronting their ignorance, and the new curriculum features a beautiful sample of age-appropriate music from a wide variety of cultures as a result.

As we head into the 2021 Program year, I am excited to share this work with our little ones, including students at UPPS and members of the Children's Choir. As it becomes safe to do so, I also hope to develop a program for families to explore music making with children that are too young to take part in our traditional choirs. Thank you, UPC, for your support in this work - we can do better, together!

- The Realm Connect App...this will replace the old ChurchLife app.


