# Nancy's Summer Plans



Dear friends,

Many of you have been asking where I am in my seminary process. Seems like it is time for an update! I recently finished the spring semester of my fourth year, having taken a course in Presbyterian polity and a lectionary course that focused on questions of goodness and violence. I plan to graduate in June 2023, with ordination soon to follow! I only have three "regular" courses remaining plus a summer internship called Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE).

Here is a note about CPE from the UNC Hospitals website:

"Pastoral Care and the CPE Program are well integrated into the life and mission of UNC Hospitals. CPE students are valued members of the health care team, and participate in patient care, family meetings and ethics consults. CPE students work alongside staff chaplains within a large pastoral care department, with opportunities for multidisciplinary learning throughout our hospitals. CPE provides students with the opportunity to integrate their personal history and their theological heritage into an authentic pastoral identity. Students work with their supervisor to craft individual learning goals in this adult education format."


I will be doing CPE this summer from May 23 - August 7. What this means is that, for the most part, I will be away from my children's ministry duties at UPC. Things that need to be done will still happen, and Vacation Bible School is in good hands!

My CPE placement is at the Hillsborough campus of UNC Hospitals, and the CPE program there is somewhat of a hybrid between pastoral care in the hospital and pastoral care in a community setting. My community setting will be UPC! This means that while I will not be doing much children's ministry over the summer, I will be doing some pastoral care with this congregation. My hope is that it will help me get to know some of you better and will deepen my pastoral identity in this family of faith.

The exact number of hours I will be in each place is not yet clear, but just know that if you see me around the church halls during the week this summer, I will likely be working in a capacity outside of what I have been doing for the past 7+ years. Not to fear - I am definitely planning to return to children's ministry full-time in August. I am looking forward to growth this summer, both as a person and as a pastor, and I trust that this process will be good for both me and the Church. I welcome your prayers as I enter into a realm that will be new for me - full-time pastoral care - and I look forward to updating you along the way and once I have completed this CPE unit.

# Spring Endowment Report

The UPC Endowment Committee has five spring projects that the UPC Session approved at its April meeting. These projects are as follows:

- **\$1,078 to the UPC Youth Ministry** for COVID Rapid Tests for 2022 Youth Travel (Montreat Youth Conference, Montreat Worship & Music Conference, and Appalachia Service Project).
- \$5000 to PCM of NC, the final year of a three-year commitment.
- \$1000 to Faith Connections for Mental Health for Keynote Speaker & Travel Expenses for the 2023 NAMI Conference.
- **\$8000 to Haiti Outreach Ministry and Leon Dorleans** for continuation of Espwa campus construction for classrooms for Bible study and vocational training in Port-au-Prince, Haiti.
- \$10,000 to PCM of UNC for the second year commitment to help fund a Pilot Pastoral Resident.

We are grateful to the Endowment Committee for their thoughtfulness and intentionality in the consideration and recommendation process!

# Celebrating the Women's Retreat

On Saturday, April 9, nearly 75 women gathered in the church fellowship hall for opening music and worship, and then continued on together for the rest of the afternoon for a time of connection, conversation, and creativity - all in the name of shared faith. The theme of the retreat was "Breath for the Bone Tired," and it marked the first time that the women of UPC have gathered together like this since 2018. In years past, this retreat has been an annual event. With staff transitions and pandemic restrictions, this tradition had been put on hold, yet interest and engagement was strong. After 2 years of not gathering, this afternoon of spiritual nurture and social connection was welcomed. Laura Owen, Beth Auman Visser, Vicki Lotz, April Smithwick, Amy McEntee, Anne Craighill Collins, and Hadley Kifner served as the planning committee, and Carolyn Karpinos shared her gifts of music on the piano. Rev. Meg Peery McLaughlin was the keynote speaker and offered two large group sessions, exploring the text from Ezekiel 37 when God says to the tired and weary, "I will put my Spirit in you and you will live." In addition to the keynote sessions, there was time for small group conversation, crafting, praying, flower arranging, walking in the arboretum, and, finally, sharing a catered meal together.

**Improv 101:** We will explore the practice of improvisation through a series of games designed to tap into your imagination, spontaneity and creativity.


**Ultimate Frisbee:** Come learn the basic rules of Ultimate Frisbee, participate in a few drills to work on skills, and then scrimmage with friends.

### Presbyterian Women Responding to the Crisis in Ukraine

When we watch the news and hear the stories of all that is going on in Ukraine -- plus the refugees pouring into the neighboring countries -- our hearts are broken. We cry out to God, "What can we do? How can we help?" A few weeks ago the Coordinating Team of Presbyterian Women decided to act. We decided to send a donation -- \$300 out of our budget -- to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance to help those hurting from the Ukraine war.

The associate for Refugees and Asylum with PDA, Susan Krehbiel, spoke about the situation in Ukraine on an information video in March. She shared some scriptures from the Bible and said, "What if I were in the midst of a crisis. How would I hear these words?"

"O God, you are my God, I seek you, my soul thirsts for you; my flesh faints for you, as in a dry and weary land where there is no water." Psalm 63:1 NRSV

We all know these words. These are the words of crying out to God. Maybe we have even prayed them at some low moment in our lives. These words are the prayer of anyone who is in crisis or struggling or in despair. No matter if they are in the streets of America with no food or having to leave behind home and maybe loved ones in Ukraine. Right now they might be the words of someone in Ukraine looking around seeing their county, their neighborhood, the house next door, in shambles. Atrocities happening. The sounds of sirens. These are the words of anyone whose life is crumbling and crashing. Desperate. Crying from the depth of one's soul. There is a thirst for God. A longing for God to come alongside. To be "with" them. Not to face the crisis alone.

Susan Krehbiel then shared on the video more hopeful words from the book of Isaiah:

"Ho, everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and you that have no money, come buy and eat! ... " Isaiah 55:1 NRSV

As God's people we are the ones who can be the instruments of God's peace, God's help to those who are in despair, the "thirsty" ones. The PW Coordinating Team responded on behalf of all UPC Presbyterian Women with the donation to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for the Ukraine emergency. PDA is right now working with partners on the ground in Europe to bring what is needed to those leaving Ukraine, to bring help to those displaced, to bring help to those still in Ukraine. Bringing water, food, relief – help, hope.

And we continue to pray. And we encourage others to pray -- to weave prayer into your daily life for the needs of all those who are crying out to God for help.
