The nominees in this report are presented by the Nominating Committee to serve the congregation of University Presbyterian Church.

Elders, filling unexpired terms



Lyn Billings (Class of 2024) joined UPC in 2000 and has been active in the church ever since. She and her husband, Ed, raised their two children, Sam and Katie, in Chapel Hill and at UPC where they participated in Sunday School, PYC, and the youth musicals before heading off into the world.
