As WASP-y as it may be, on my bucket list is to be at King's College Cambridge Chapel on Christmas Eve to hear the boys choir lead Lessons and Carols. So, when Caroline was singing the first verse of "Once in Royal David's City" on repeat on the way home from Choristers practice, of course my heart was swelling. My feelings didn't surprise me. How could I not be grateful for that little voice in the backseat, for this church for teaching children to sing their faith? Yes, thanks be to God. What did surprise me was Zanna's comment when we were pulling into the neighborhood after the 32nd rendition. Zanna said, "Mother Mary should really be the Savior, because without her Christmas wouldn't exist."

I was intentionally silent in the wake of her statement. I just kept driving through the dark as Caroline started the 33rd round of the song.

Part of me wanted to jump in and say that surely God would have figured out another plan had Mary said no. Surely Jesus is the only Savior we know.


I thought about teaching her about the word *theotokos* (God-bearer), and then wondered if her comment had something to do with the books that now sit on her bedside table at night. A couple of weeks back UPC hosted an outstanding educator to lead us in a workshop on Faith and Sexuality and she recommended some age-appropriate books. So Zanna has been reading about eggs and fallopian tubes and asking a lot of questions. On Advent 4, we'll use one of my favorite declarations of faith, in which we'll affirm that "Jesus was born of woman as is every child, yet born of God's power as was no other child."

Thanks be to God that Zanna can note the stunning significance that Jesus was born of woman as is every child. I am glad that part of my daughter's faith is a holy appreciation of what happened in the very intimate places of a young woman's body long ago and that part of her faith is an acknowledgement of a woman's "YES" to God's work of salvation.

I suppose what I'd like to say to you, church, is a word of deep and abiding gratitude for being a church that nurtures such a faith, and allows us all to sing it. Indeed, gratitude as well as a word of encouragement for this particular part of the body of Christ to continue to say YES to where God is working salvation all around and through us.

Family Meeting, Part 2

When our second boiler died, I called a "family meeting" in worship. I told visitors to listen in as I explained that we were pricing new boilers while at the same time running our annual stewardship campaign. Great timing! (I think even the back row could feel me roll my eyes). Two new boilers cost around \$130K. I invited the UPC family to make a special gift to help. A number of you did, and **we are so grateful**. That same week, the UPC Endowment met to consider the grant applications for their Fall disbursement. (The UPC Endowment keeps the principal in place, and allocates 5% of the average interest across 5 years primarily to a variety of outreach projects). The Endowment Committee generously decided to give the full Fall disbursement (\$53K) to offset the cost of one boiler. Additionally, they asked the Session to take a special vote to take the Endowment's allocated portion of a bequest (\$52K) to enable the Church to purchase a second boiler per the recommendation of our HVAC consultants.

We communicated this good news to the congregation the next week, and perhaps it seemed like the conversation was over. But as with any functioning family, communication has to keep on happening!

So here is where we are: while the boilers are covered, this year has been daunting with other property repairs that are less obvious on a Sunday morning (roof repair and waterproofing). Additionally, non-pledged giving, which is the hardest thing to guess and generally comes in during the month of December, is at least \$50K off. Let me say that pledges are steady! And our 2023 Stewardship campaign is off to a great start. All signs point toward fiscal health.

So, as I bring this Family Meeting Part 2, I will loop back to the essential message of the first one. **Heat is coming:** it is literally on a truck from California and we're ready to install it as soon as it arrives! **And your gifts are needed**. Consider helping UPC end this year in the black!

About our Christmas Eve Offering (collected at all 3 services)

Every penny of our Christmas Eve Offering goes to support a couple of projects. Half will go to the Pastor's Discretionary Fund which enables UPC to offer assistance with bills for those in need of episodic help. The other half will go to a campaign in our Presbytery kick-started by First Presbyterian of Durham to relieve medical debt throughout the state of North Carolina. In Partnership with RIP Medical Debt, for every dollar given, \$100 of medical debt is erased. This partnership emerged out of First Durham's racial equity team who led the Church through a number of workshops and book studies but wished to do something to make a difference. Learning that medical debt is a primary driver of poverty (and emotional stress) among communities of color, they are inviting all churches in the Presbytery to join them in a campaign to eliminate as much debt as possible, particularly within the eight counties in our state experiencing the most medical debt among minority communities. We hoped to offer some Sunday morning education about RIP Medical Debt in December ahead of the offering but stay tuned to learn more about this in January. PCM Fall Update



The fall semester has flown by for PCM! It's hard to believe that, as I write this, our students are preparing to head home for Thanksgiving break and already have their eye on finals. We've finished up our last program of the semester, and we're wrapping up our Bible study and small groups.

This fall has seen endless incredible moments and projects, one being something you may have already seen strolling past the church: our pride picnic tables! Being a More Light (LGBTQ-affirming) campus ministry is incredibly important to our students, and the picnic table project let them live that out in a visible way. Lillie Chilton ('23) and Millie Pullman ('24) took the lead on the project, but all hands were on deck when it was time to paint. They're a perfect spot for a lunch or a moment of reflection, surrounded by the handprints of our students and the PYC youth! You're always welcome there (you just may end up listening in on Bible study!).

This fall also saw a transition we didn't know if we could ever expect: a move back to eating upstairs, in our own PCM space. When I started working for PCM in 2018, the space was an embodiment of PCM culture. Packing into the kitchen to all pray together before the meal, sitting with a big group and welcome each other in to full tables, and shifting just a few feet to the couches for program—this was all a practice that up until now, only myself and our current senior class had ever been a part of. At our yearly alumni event, we took a chance and tried it again, letting the PCM alumni show us all



how it's done, and to give them the feeling of being back in the space again. The experience was beloved all around, and we have made the official change to have dinner in our space as long as it continues to feel safe and sustainable. This piece of PCM's culture has been reintroduced with joy, and you can hear it all around the church when the kitchen fills with laughter on a Thursday evening.



By the time you read this, we'll have had our PCM Thanksgiving, complete with the ever-intense dessert competition, judged by a brave panel of PCM Board members, and the PCM space will be beginning to quiet down and thin out as students head home for winter break. We are, always, endlessly thankful for the ways the church allows us to provide a safe, welcoming home to all of our students. Look out for another update from us soon!



Session Update

At their regularly scheduled meeting in November, the UPC Session:

- Approved two baptisms.
- Heard a report from Brian Vandersea on the 117th New Hope Presbytery Meeting.
- Received a report from the Stewardship Committee on the state of the pledge drive, with very positive preliminary
 results and an increase in the average pledge. The committee members will contact those who have pledged in the past
 but have not yet pledged for 2023 to help the church meet its final goal.
- Heard from the Property Committee on the purchase and installation of the new boilers, with expected installation completed by December 11.
- Heard that a new granite wall in the Memorial Garden will be installed under the bay window and the space replanted.
- Received the Treasurer's Report. Non-pledge revenue continues to trend lower than budgeted, but optimism remains
 for meeting the 2022 budget.
