# Created to Worship



As many of you know, I have been working my way through the process that leads to ordination as Minister of Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A). Part of that process includes taking ordination exams. Below you will find a newsletter article I wrote recently as part of the Worship & Sacraments exam, including rationale for and encouragement of regular participation in the church's worship.

### Greetings, Family of Faith!

One of my favorite moments of the week is on Sunday mornings when members of our church family start streaming through the doors, ready for worship. It feels like a family reunion to me. We have gone our separate ways during the week, some returning on a weekday for a committee meeting or a church volunteer task. Some of us have passed in the grocery store or have gathered at the soup kitchen to serve a meal to our homeless neighbors. The Book of Order, the constitution of our denomination, reminds us that "the faith, life, and worship of the Church are inseparable." (DfW, Preface, 74) We believe that every part of our life together – worship, fellowship, study, and service – is connected to every other part. And on Sunday morning, we are here together for worship, ready to glorify God and ready to respond in gratitude.

One of the confessions of our denomination, the Westminster Shorter Catechism, says, "Man's chief end is to glorify God, and to enjoy him forever." (7.001) We were created to worship God! And that is not something we can do on our own. Worship is a communal act, which means we show up to worship together! It is my hope that worship does not feel like something you have to do but rather like something you get to do. We were people created to worship, so it feels like a natural thing in which we take part.

If you are here regularly on Sunday mornings, I encourage you to keep coming. If you have taken a pause from weekly Sunday worship, we would love to see you back in the pews on a regular basis. If it has been a while since we have seen you at all, please join us. We would love to have you return to our midst. If you are looking for a church home, I hope you will give this church a try. Regardless of who you are or when the last time was that you came to worship, you are welcome here. You are welcome with your certainties and with your doubts. You are welcome with your questions and your wonderings. You are welcome just as you are, and you are a vital part of this faith family. We are not the same without you!

For those of you who have children, please bring them with you to worship! God created children with their wiggles, laughs, and cries. It does not matter if your children are on their best behavior; we want them here! I hope you will make the effort to get out the door to church each Sunday. We learn to worship by imitating. Just as we learn to walk and talk by watching, listening, and imitating others, we learn to worship by watching, listening, and by participating in it. Children will learn about our central act of worship – and will learn how to worship – by being present with the community of faith.

As you know, once we gather for worship, we do not stay here. The gathered people are equipped to go out into the world. The good news is too good to keep to ourselves! So we gather around Word and Sacrament, are refreshed and renewed for our calling and our work in the world around us. There is no place we can go that God has not already been. God is with us in the walls of this church, and God is with you in your office, at the dentist, and on the playground. God is everywhere. May we make it a priority to gather each Sunday as a community of faith – together – to do what we were created to do as we worship. May it be so.


# Palm Sunday (April 2)

Palm Sunday begins Holy Week, as we remember Jesus' triumphant entry into lerusalem. Join us for worship as we wave palm branches and worship together!



# Maundy Thursday (April 6, 7:30 pm)

Maundy Thursday is the day during Holy Week that commemorates Jesus' last meal with his disciples, when he washed their feet and gave them the commandment (mandate, where we get the word Maundy) to love one another. Join us in the Sanctuary for a contemplative service, including Holy Communion, to reflect on how Jesus proclaimed the gospel through service and love.



# Good Friday Peace Walk (April 7, 10:00 am)

This year marks the 50th anniversary of MLK's Letter from a Birmingham Jail, written after he was arrested on Good Friday. Several Chapel Hill churches will commemorate this anniversary with a Good Friday peace walk and reading. Beginning at St. Pauls AME, the walk will conclude at University Baptist Church, where Chapel Hill clergy will read from the letter. All are welcome.



# Good Friday Worship (April 7, 7:30 pm)

On the Friday of Holy Week, we will worship together in a Service of Tenebrae. Tenebrae is the Latin word meaning darkness. Sometimes we learn things in the dark, in the shadows, that we could have never learned or appreciated in the bright light of day. On Good Friday, we will read the story of Jesus' passion (his suffering and death) and extinguish lights until we leave the sanctuary in complete darkness, awaiting the glorious light of Easter morning.

# Taizé Worship (April 11, 7:00 pm)

Together, we'll consider two commandments each week. Join us for all 5 weeks, or pop in as you can.




# Vance Barron Hall Class (Topical Studies/Learning)

### April 23: Guest Speaker Dr. Douglas Lungu



In the Fall of 2022, we celebrated the ministry of former UPC Music Minister Thomas Brown with the gift of a new Steinway B piano and the establishment of the Thomas Brown Recital Series. A gifted recitalist, Tom blessed the church and larger community during his tenure with concert presentations of great piano masterworks. This spring, we present the second installation in this series. Pianist Kirsten Homdrom will present a program entitled "There is peace even in the storm," featuring works by Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, Germaine Tailleferre, Takashi Yoshimatsu and W. A. Mozart.

American keyboardist Kirsten Homdrom's performances span both the solo and collaborative realms, with repertoire ranging from the 1600's to the present. She has premiered new works by composer Keane Southard for both piano and organ and enjoys playing standards in the classical repertoire as well as hidden gems both old and new. Homdrom has performed in venues throughout the United States, as well as in England and the Czech Republic.

Equally at home in the world of sacred music, Homdrom is committed to sharing the gift of music with others through education and worship. She served as Trinity Scholar at Christ Church Episcopal in Hudson, Ohio, Director of Music at Venice Presbyterian Church in Ross, Ohio, and currently serves as Associate Director of Music at White Memorial Presbyterian Church in Raleigh, North Carolina.



Homdrom holds a Bachelor of Music degree in Piano Performance, Magna Cum Laude, from Baldwin-Wallace University Conservatory of Music, and Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees in Piano Performance from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. Primary teachers include pianists Eugene and Elisabeth Pridonoff, Robert Mayerovitch, Sungeun Kim, and Carla McElhaney; and organists Michael Unger, Roberta Gary, and Margaret Scharf.

# Global Outreach

In 2007, as I was preparing to retire as a pediatrician, I asked Bob Dunham whether there were any groups within the Presbyterian Church that were involved in mission work. He suggested that I call the Medical Benevolence Foundation (MBF) and get on their board, which I did. The board was comprised of a vibrant group of ministers, lawyers, engineers. social workers – not just doctors. Many board members had done extensive faith-based international missionary work.

MBF began with missionary doctors in the early 1960s, and then expanded in an effort to strengthen local leaders who oversee hospitals, clinics, and nursing schools. Much of their Christ-driven work is done in Haiti, Democratic Republic of Congo, Malawi, and Kenya, but they are involved in many other countries as well. MBF staff gets to know the local leaders of the church and medical communities, thereby finding out what they need most to become more successful medically. The money raised by MBF then gets applied to the stated needs of the local medical personnel.



For three years, I served on the main MBF board, and then served several more years on their executive committee. I ultimately became their official photographer and travelled to each of these countries named above. I have enjoyed sharing my slides at UPC after a number of these trips. The pictures I took have been used for marketing, enhancing the MBF website, and in presentations to help explain the needs of the people MBF serves.



Through the Global Outreach Committee, UPC has supported MBF financially every year since 1976. In 2018, UPC also gave additional money to help support an amazing MBF initiative – The LifeSavers program. Groups of three people were trained in a separate facility and then funded by groups such as MBF to visit rural clinics in Malawi. MBF hired one such group comprised of an RN, a person familiar with pharmacy issues, and a person to oversee quality of care. The results of this educational initiative have been

astounding. A few years after the initiation of this country-wide intervention, data was collected from all the teams visiting rural Malawi clinics. Merely by teaching those people who delivered babies basic information about resuscitation techniques and treatment of post-partum hemorrhage, over 300 babies' lives had been saved! An amazing result, Another recent initiative has been to fund the development of a surgical residency program at one of the larger hospitals in Malawi. The goal of this program is to recruit students who plan to remain in Malawi. In Malawi alone, MBF supports 5 hospitals, 4 nursing schools and 24 outlying clinics.

# What is a Stephen Minister?

In March UPC commissioned two new Stephen Ministers, Dana Greenwood and Milton Reid, to join the cohort of previously trained Stephen Ministers at our church. Perhaps you have heard of Stephen Ministry, but you are asking yourself: "So what is a Stephen Minister?"

Stephen Ministers are lay congregation members trained to provide one-to-one care to those who are experiencing a difficult time in life. Grief, divorce, job loss, chronic or terminal illness, relocation, etc. are some of the common life stressors that bring people to seek the cost-free confidential care of a Stephen Minister. Stephen Ministers come from all walks of life, but they all share a passion for bringing Christ's love and care to people during a time of need. Stephen Ministers participate in a specific 50-hour Christ-centered training that equips them with essential caring and relating skills.

UPC has been a Stephen Ministry Congregation since 1991 and has trained well over 100 members to serve as Stephen Ministers. Currently, our congregation has 13 active Stephen Ministers and Stephen Leaders.
