Summer Sermon Series



June & July: Read it Again

What is it that a child says after being read a favorite book? "Read It Again." That's what we're doing in June and July with some favorite childhood stories: David & Goliath, Samson & Delilah, Noah's Ark, Joshua & the Walls of Jericho. Let's see what these old favorites have to say to us today.



August: Then Sings My Soul...

Who has a favorite hymn? It's time to cast your vote because for four weeks in August we'll preach a sermon centered around the top four hymns crowd-sourced from the congregation. A Resident's Reflection

Residency Reflection from Kim Rubish:

Friends at UPC, I will never be able to say enough how this residency has blessed me, and my gratitude for the support of the congregation is endless. This is, as much as I hate to say it, my goodbye as PCM's Pastoral Resident. And as much as I will miss the bustling, energetic feeling of PCM, this program has also prepared me so, so well to move up and on, to keep growing in my ministry in a new environment.

You may not have seen me much during my two years as the resident, largely because my Sundays have been spent elsewhere; half of my role, half of my hours have been spent serving Cary Presbyterian Church, where you can find me on most given Sundays. Recently, when I preached my final sermon at CPC, someone snagged me after the service to comment on the confidence I've gained since this position began two years ago. I stepped through the doors shy, nervous, and extremely concerned about getting it all right, and I am wrapping up this role feeling confident, calm, and extremely sure I don't have it all right (and not too worried about it). Above and beyond all else, that is what this two years has offered me: a chance to dip my toe into a million different ministry pools, to gain competencies where I didn't even know I needed them, and to get really, really used to always having more to learn and further to grow. This residency was exactly what I needed as I came out of seminary, and the support of UPC has been so, so essential in allowing this to happen. I cannot wait to follow along (via email of course) as PCM and CPC continue to pour into recent seminary grads through this position.

The Pastoral Residency also confirmed for me what I, largely, already knew: much of my heart for ministry lies in pastoral care. The residency model allowed us to greatly expand pastoral care at PCM, which was both incredibly meaningful to me and, I believe, extremely important for students. This residency truly solidified my commitment to pastoral care, which led me to discerning what comes next: In early July, I will make my way up the road to begin a year-long residency program as a chaplain at UNC Medical Center. This will hone in on and deepen my skills for pastoral care, giving me a bit more specified training before I begin to seek a pastoral call a year from now!

All this being said, I wish PCM and UPC nothing but joy and delight as both spaces prepare to welcome a new pastoral resident (and a new fantastic intern!). PCM and UPC provide a warm, connective, exceptional learning environment, and I truly could not be happier to leave knowing that someone else will soon get to experience what a gift this residency program is. I look forward to sinking into the rest and renewal that will come from engaging in worship from the pews, and hope to see many of you soon!

In 2021, the PCM staffing model was expanded to include a two-year Pastoral Resident position in partnership with Cary Presbyterian Church, in addition to the long-standing Seminary Intern position. As PCM says goodbye to Kim Rubish as our Pilot Pastoral Resident, and Alli Buikema as our Seminary Intern, we prepare to welcome new PCM staff (introduced below).

PCM continues to be deeply grateful to UPC for their unwavering support of PCM as we nurture college students, seminary students, and now recent seminary graduates! PCM is a flagship campus ministry program in the PC(USA), and we are now a teaching ministry as we train future campus ministers with in-depth mentoring and hands-on experience.

Margie just completed her first-year student at Duke Divinity School where she is pursuing an MDiv with a concentration in "Faith, Food, and Environmental Justice." Stephen Ministry

Stephen Ministers are available to provide that extra caring and support by listening to the thoughts and concerns that are weighing you down. When times are tough, it seems like everyone has advice to give. But often it isn't advice you need or want—but rather a non-judgmental listening ear.

Stephen Ministers are trained lay Christians who provide care by listening instead of telling you what to do. Their help is completely confidential and cost free.
