We have officially surpassed our goal of \$1.98M! Amazing! And you might be thinking, "UPC has already hit the publicized goal. Is my pledge really needed now?"

The answer is an emphatic **YES!** Every pledge is gratefully received and wisely stewarded to contribute to our wider mission and outreach. We have officially hit our initial goal, but that goal was set before we had a clear picture of our

2024 expenses. There is a gap between our pledge goal and our hoped-for budget. So, we're setting a stretch goal of \$2.05M (\$70K more) to help strengthen our budget to support all that we're planning for 2024.

# Pastor's Message



The timer on the bell in our steeple has been a little bit off recently. In addition to chiming the bell manually to signal the beginning of a worship service, it is also programmed to automatically chime the noon hour each day. Lately, however, it has taken to ringing whenever it pleases (I blame Artificial Intelligence). A few weeks back I heard the bell ringing out in the cool morning air and was grateful to know that it was 8:06 am. I believe 12:43 pm was another time deemed significant by this rogue steeple bell.

I've decided to lean into it – assume it's a reminder that every moment can be sacred, filled with holy purpose and promise. It also strikes me as a harbinger of some changes we are introducing to one of our main vehicles for communication – The Chimes. Yep, the document that you are reading right now! For as long as almost all of us can remember, The Chimes has been published on or close to the first day of each month - some might say like clockwork.

While this issue is arriving in your inbox around the first of January, from here on out *The Chimes* will be following a different schedule – one shaped more by the contours of the church year. It has long been the case that an edition of *The Chimes* would come out right in the middle of a liturgical or programmatic season, which made for some awkward situations from time to time. Now, we will have an edition that covers the new year and another for the season of Lent. One *Chimes* will carry us from Easter to Pentecost and then two editions to cover the summer season. Another couple will ready us for everything that the Fall brings and a final edition will tell us everything we need to know about Advent. In all we will switch to publishing The Chimes eight times per year.

This does mean that we will need to be a bit more disciplined in getting information included in each edition that covers a longer period of time. Fear not, though, our Director of Communications and Stewardship Erin Collier will make the new deadlines as plain as can be to all the usual committees and ministries that are featured in the newsletter.

It is also my conviction that a church newsletter ought to be about more than sharing information. Newsletters are also tools for formation; a means for deepening our connections to one another. It is our hope that future editions of *The Chimes* will also include story-telling about our members and the ministry we share together. So as we turn the page to 2024, I invite you to lean into this new schedule and the emerging content of our newsletter and see if we can't discover the sacred promise and purpose of every moment and every person together.

# Star Words: An Epiphany Tradition

Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord rises upon you. - Isaiah 60:1

"Epiphany is a day in the liturgical calendar when we celebrate the magi's arrival to Jesus. The magi, a noble group of people, studied stars and knew when a new one appeared. The star guided them to the place of Jesus' birth. There, they presented the young lesus with gifts fit for a king, recognizing and honoring him." - from Illustrated Ministry

Like the ancient magi, faithful people in all generations continue to look for the light of God along the journey.

Again this year, UPC will celebrate the season of Epiphany through the sacred and creative practice of receiving "star

words." In worship on Sunday, Dec. 31, we invited everyone to come forward and receive at random, a small paper star with one word written on it.

That word is a "star word" and serves as an invitation for you to reflect on how that one word relates to your life and how you relate to it in the coming year. You may find that your star word is inspiring or confusing, challenging or perplexing; how it invites you into blessing.

Did you receive a star word on Sunday? We invite you to place it somewhere that you will see it on a regular basis, and then pay attention for ways in which that word shows up in your life (and how God shows up through that word).

Missed worship on Sunday and want a star word? Come by the church office during the week, or look for Hadley on Sunday morning.



### The New UPC Chrismon Tree



You may have noticed a new addition to our decor during Advent - a Chrismon tree! Our newly formed Chrismon guild gathered during Advent learning how to make beaded Chrismons ("Christ monograms").

Here's what these Chrismons mean:

- Cross symbolic of lesus' death on the cross
- Fish the Greek word for fish is IXOYE, which is also the acrostic for the Greek words meaning "Jesus Christ, God's Son, Savior." Early Christians used this symbol as a sign to find each other in times of persecution.
- Angel angels announced both the birth and the resurrection of Christ
- Crown symbolizes the kingship of Christ

Many thanks to our guild members who helped create these beautiful Chrismons - we look forward to seeing this tradition continue and what you will add to the tree next year!

### January Sermon Series: Everyone's Favorite Heresies

Epiphany isn't until January 6, but I am guessing you've put the tree by the curb. I hope your Star Word (details on p. 6) is on your bathroom mirror, guiding you in this New Year. Even though you've likely packed away the nativities, the impact of this baby continues.

The church has had a lot to say about this Christ child. And as we begin a new year of our resolution to follow in his way, we are kicking off 2024 with a special sermon series called "Everyone's Favorite Heresies." The word heresy comes from a Greek word meaning "choice" or "thing chosen," meaning a heretic was someone who made a theological choice that the wider church decided was invalid. As we start this series, we want to be clear about a few things:



- First, to be labeled a heretic, you have to be within the tradition itself. If you don't consider yourself a Christian, you aren't a heretic: you just aren't a Christian. A heretic is someone who is a Christian, but who then makes some sort of errant theological choice, and either defends a falsehood or denies a truth of the church universal. So to be clear: our Jewish, Hindu, Islamic, or even atheist siblings are not heretics.
- Second, virtually all of the people history regards as heretics were, by and large, really faithful, thoughtful people who had an idea that initiated important discussion —but who, in the end, came down in a different place than the rest of the church. Most heretics were genuinely seeking to help the church discover more about what it means to follow this person named lesus.

There is so much we can learn about our own faith today by examining these "favorite" heresies of our church history. I hope you'll join us in the new year as we consider these questions:

- January 7: Was Jesus really a human? (Docetism)
- January 14: Do Christians really need the God of the Old Testament? (Marcionism)
- January 21: Can't we just earn our way into heaven? (Pelagianism)
- January 28: Don't Christians need to be perfect? Pastors at least? (Donatism)

## Guest Preacher Rev. Paul Roberts (Feb. 11)

We are delighted to welcome the Reverend Paul Timothy Roberts, Sr., to the UPC pulpit on Sunday, Feb. 11. A graduate of Princeton University (BA in Architecture and African American Studies) and the Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta (M.Div. with a concentration in New Testament studies), Rev. Roberts worked in both the business sector and as a pastor before becoming the President of Johnson C. Smith Theological Seminary in Atlanta in 2010. Under the leadership of Rev. Roberts, JCSTS has redefined itself—and is helping redefine theological education and expanding social justice understanding in the process.

In addition to preaching at both services, Rev. Roberts will also lead the final week of our Racial Equity class (see p. 10), discussing how our Christian faith can inform our efforts to make amends for past wrongs of racial discrimination.



# From the Racial Equity Team

He has told you, O mortal, what is good, and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God? -Micah 6:8

The Holy Spirit pushes the Church to be fully inclusive. The UPC Racial Equity Team (RET) exists because we are called to know and trust the work of the Holy Spirit, to uphold God's work in our church, and to be a witness of justice and equity in the community at-large.

The RET first formed in 2020 with a mandate from the Session. The team consisted of a number of church members from different walks of life who felt called to shepherd UPC through these important conversations. The team spent the better part of its first year building relationships with one another, sharing our own stories that have informed how we think and feel about race. This team prayed, studied and worked to discern a pathway for UPC to become an anti-racist church and congregation.

Since that point in time the RET has offered members of our church and the community at-large several opportunities to engage in book studies, seminars, movie viewing/discussion and community activities centered around the issues of racism.

#### In 2023 the RET:

- Read and discussed the book, Wait, Is this Racist?
- Attended a viewing and discussion of the movie, Five Little Girls, co-hosted by Binkley Baptist Church and the Orange County Community Remembrance Coalition (OCCRC),
- Offered our own fall film series on two evenings consisting of dinner, movie and discussion for two films— Lowndes County and I'm Smart, Too.
- Participated in an ecumenical reading of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s Letter from Birmingham Jail as this important document marked its 60th anniversary.
- The RET, the church staff, officers and other interested church members all received anti-racism training.

In 2024, the RET is leading a 5-week class on Sunday mornings based on the book From Here to Equality (details on p. 10).



### Souper Bowl of Caring (Feb. 11)

The Souper Bowl of Caring began over 30 years ago with a simple prayer from a single youth group: "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those without a bowl of soup to eat." On Sunday, February 11, Kirk Club youth will take part in this national effort to love our neighbors. They will hold soup pots at the sanctuary doors following worship to collect money for those who are hungry and hurting. Since 1990, over \$193 million in dollars and food has been generated while benefiting thousands of soup kitchens, food banks, meal programs and other hungerrelief charities in local communities. 100% of the money we collect at UPC will go to TABLE. # Fall Endowment Report

In November 2023, the Endowment Committee recommended and the Session approved the following Endowment disbursements:

- From Global Outreach, a request of \$10,000 for Haiti Outreach Ministries (HOM) for clinic improvement to address staffing needs and retaining clinicians. The money will be allocated to the salaries of medical personnel at HOM and it is anticipated that retention will improve, morale will increase, and assuming recruitment will improve, medical outcomes will improve.
- From the PCM of Chapel Hill Board (governing body of PCM) a request for \$9,000 to continue the PCM Pastoral Resident program. The Pastoral Resident is split 50:50 with Cary Presbyterian Church. The long-term goal is to be selfsustaining and to not require any Endowment funding in the next 2-3 years.
- From the UPC co-pastors, a request for \$3,000 to fund a guest preacher in February 2024. This request will be funded by the Margaret McLaughlin Guest Preacher Fund (a restricted fund in the UPC unrestricted account). The guest preacher will be the Reverend Paul Roberts, Sr., President of Johnson C. Smith Theological Seminary in Atlanta, GA.

Who may be suggested as a candidate?

All members are eligible for nomination.

Who may recommend a candidate?

Any member of UPC may recommend candidates.

Do I need permission from the candidate before I submit his or her name?

No, the Nominating Committee will verify candidates' willingness to serve before they are nominated. (You need prior permission only if you choose to make a nomination from the floor during a congregational meeting.)

May I submit my own name?

Yes.

## Session Report

In December 2023, the UPC Session:

- Approved two baptisms, one marriage, and accepted two families into membership
- Approved the 2024 Benevolence acceptance form for support of Presbytery and Unified Mission
- Examined and welcomed the incoming classes of Elders and Deacons
- Received a report from the Stewardship Committee on the state of the pledge drive
- Approved the UPPS 2024 budget and 2024/25 tuition changes and additions to the Parent's Handbook
- Approved the updated PCM Covenant Agreement and authorized PCM to establish an endowment with the Presbyterian Foundation
- Approved the revised UPC Fundraising Policy
- Granted the Administrative Committee authority to make changes to the church's operating bank accounts with the objective of being able to ensure that all funds are insured or guaranteed by the US government, are reasonably accessible in the event of an emergency, and earn a money market rate of return.
- Received the Treasurer's Report, which was hopeful for a strong December to meet the 2023 budget
- A letter of appreciation was read to the outgoing Elders Sandy Alexander, Nate Garber, Patty Baum Haydon, Amy McEntee, Anna Rose Medley, Scott Singleton, Scott Smith, and Bob Slater
