Pastor's Message

Ellen, Andrew, Jessica, Joe, Becca, Chris, Shannon, Pen, MaryAnn, Michael, Elizabeth, Dan, Heather, and then the name many of you will be familiar with, Anna (Pinckney Straight).

These are the names of some of our dearest colleagues in the Presbyterian Church. In 2008, thanks to a grant from the Endowment of Village Presbyterian Church, this collection of clergy gathered in Kansas City for the inaugural meeting of what would in time come to be named "the Well." We have met every year since – barring one compliments of COVID – to draw from the living waters of Scripture together and to share in sacred friendship.

The more clinical description of this group would be that we each bring exegetical papers on preaching texts for the coming year, so that at the end of the week we walk away with a treasure-trove of scholarship, much of it informing what you hear from the pulpit week to week. While it is true that the papers provide the bones of this group, it does not even come close to describing the Well's heart.

The heart of the group is sitting on a porch in Austin underneath a spray of jasmine (with a garbage truck picking the unfortunately late hour to empty the dumpster down below) as one friend relayed what it was like to rush his 9-month-old son in for emergency heart transplant surgery; or holding space with a parent who tearfully described sitting in a Target parking lot and weeping for a severely depressed and suicidal 12-year-old daughter; or gathering around a single computer screen to zoom with one of our own who had a terrible reaction to anesthesia during a routine surgery and finds herself disabled in ways neither she nor we could have imagined. Those are just a few of the tender and sacred moments I recall – not to mention the evenings spent singing karaoke duets or having spontaneous dance parties and laughing until it hurts. All of this I file under the art of holy friendship. Our annual





gatherings convene the second week after Easter, and it is something that we hold sacred in the rhythm of our year. I am convinced that groups like these are crucial to sustain every pastor in the odd and wondrous calling that is pastoral ministry.

Because it is an odd and wondrous calling, the truth is that we also accompany one another through the very far-ranging and absolutely mundane matters that professional ministry presents you with on the regular. Planning a memorial service with an extremely conflicted family? Somebody in the group has been there and has some pointers. Never led a capital campaign? Plenty of others have and are eager to share the learnings of both their successes and failures. The boilers went out and you've got Advent-crowds coming to worship in less than three days? Somebody has been there before. Jan Edmiston, child of UPC and now Presbytery Executive in Charlotte recently wrote a blog post (achurchforstarvingartists.blog/which-job) about the number of competencies required to be clergy. Groups like these

help you hone the ones that are less a part of your wheelhouse.

I share all of this with you now – yes, to give thanks for this church that has long encouraged its pastors to cultivate these kinds of friendships and support groups (Bob Dunham was a part of the Moveable Feast, the group we patterned our own after, for much of the time he served as pastor here at UPC). The main reason I share this with you, though, is because I want you to know that UPC will be hosting and hopefully kickstarting a brand new clergy support group in the coming weeks. Thanks to a generous grant from our own Endowment and the many people who have made living gifts to that Endowment or remembered the church in their will, we will welcome a group of ten young clergy to Chapel Hill in the hopes that they, too, will begin to forge the kinds of relationships that sustain pastors in their ministry within the church of Jesus Christ in this day and age. Consider it an investment in the health of the PC(USA) as we encourage the health of a new generation of clergy.

So come April 21 - when they roll into Chapel Hill - I hope you will join me in praying for Linda, Owen, Rebecca, Andrew, Anna, Alex, Meg, Miriam, Daniel and Lauren. For a week, they'll be making 209 E. Franklin Street their home: singing morning hymns in our choir loft, connecting to our wifi, and taking afternoon breaks under the magnolia. In all of that, may the Word of God jump off the page and settle in their bones, may the churches they serve be strengthened, and may the bonds of friendship start to take root. May it be so.

Holy Week 2024



Palm Sunday March 24, 8:30 & 11:00 am

On Palm Sunday, we remember the story of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, as the crowd waved palm branches and cried out "Hosanna!" In worship on this day, you'll have the opportunity to wave your own palm branch.



Maundy Thursday March 28, 7:30 pm

Maundy Thursday is the day during Holy Week that commemorates Jesus' last meal with his disciples, when he washed their feet and gave them the commandment (mandate, where we get the word Maundy) to love one another. Join us in the Sanctuary for a contemplative service, including a meditation from Nancy Myer, handwashing, and Holy Communion, to reflect on how lesus proclaimed the gospel through service and love.



Good Friday March 29, 7:30 pm

On the Friday of Holy Week, we will worship together in a Service of Tenebrae. Tenebrae is the Latin word meaning darkness. Sometimes we learn things in the dark, in the shadows, that we could have never learned or appreciated in the bright light of day. On Good Friday, we will read the story of Jesus' passion (his suffering and death) and extinguish lights until we leave the sanctuary in complete darkness, awaiting the glorious light of Easter morning. Meg Peery McLaughlin will offer the meditation.

Celebrating Easter at UPC (March 31)

Easter Sunday Worship - 8:30 & 11:00 am

We'll worship together at 8:30 and 11:00 am on Easter Sunday. Both services will be in the Sanctuary; only the 11:00 service will be livestreamed. Instead of Sunday School on that day, we will have a potluck brunch.

Join us for a potluck Easter Brunch at 9:45 am in the Fellowship Hall! Beverages will be provided; please bring a breakfast dish to share (quiche, muffins, fruit, etc.). There's a lot happening in worship during Eastertide (the 50 day season after Easter)! Here's what to expect in April and early May:

Sunday, April 7: Stephen Ministry Commissioning

At the 11:00 worship service on April 7, we will commission our four newest Stephen Ministers (Scott Culley, Gordon Merklein, Mary Ellen Olson, and Alan Swendiman). Upon their commissioning, they will join the rest of the Stephen Ministers in their ministry of one-to-one Christian support to those in need of a listening ear, non-judgmental presence, or encouraging word. We will also commission Nape Baker as a supervision co-leader, as he has recently completed the Stephen Ministry Bridge Leader training. Tuesday, April 9: Taizé Service of Healing & Wholeness

Healing was an integral part of the ministry of Jesus. The church has been called to continue this ministry as one dimension of its concern for the wholeness of people. Through services for wholeness and healing, the church enacts in worship its ministry as a healing community. (Book of Order, Directory for Worship, W-3.5401)

Christian healing is about wholeness. Sickness and health are not limited to our physical selves: we can seek healing in body, mind, and spirit; and we can yearn for wholeness in our lives, our relationships with others, our world, and all of creation. Join us for a special service of healing and wholeness on Tuesday, April 9, at 7:30 pm in the sanctuary. This service will be in the Taizé tradition with candles, prayers in both silence and song, and scripture readings. A blessing will be offered at the end of the service, and an option to be anointed with oil will also be offered. All are invited to attend.



Sunday, April 14: Youth Sunday

Youth Sunday is a special Sunday where youth plan, write liturgy, and lead worship during the 8:30 and 11:00 am services. The morning will be filled with youth leadership and voices, with 12th grade youth lending their voice from the pulpit as well. We hope to have as many people present as possible to support the youth of UPC and to watch their gifts shine!



Sunday, April 21: Earth Care & 3rd Grade Bibles

Worship this day will include an emphasis on Earth Care (it's the day before Earth Day!), as well as the presentation of Bibles to our 3rd graders at the 11:00 service.

Sunday, April 28: Easter Hymn Festival

After our successful Sounds of Resurrection choral service last spring, our choirs will once again come together to present a special Easter-themed musical offering at the 11:00 am service on Sunday, April 28. This year, we welcome guest director Eric Wall who will work with our choirs and help to lead a hymn festival. Eric is a celebrated church musician currently serving as dean of the chapel at Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary. He is also the summer musician at Montreat and a former president of the Presbyterian Association of Musicians - and also happens to be Tristan's dad!





Sunday, May 5: Confirmation Sunday

Confirmation Sunday is always a special day in the life of the church when we welcome a new class of Confirmands who have spent a year unpacking and learning about their faith and the smaller and larger structures of the church. We expect to welcome 14 youth into the church as full members during 11:00 worship on May 5.

This day will also be the last week of Sunday School for the program year; classes will resume in September.



Sunday, May 12: Summer Schedule Begins



Eastertide Classes (April 7-May 5)

Vance Barron Hall Class: Practicing the Way

Join us in a study and discussion led by Ed and Nancy Preston and Robert Owen of John Mark Comer's latest book *Practicing the Way.* Many of you may know Comer from his New York Times bestseller *The* Ruthless Elimination of Hurry which offered a compelling, emotional and spiritual case against hurry and in favor of a slower, simpler way of life. In Practicing the Way, Comer argues that we are constantly being formed by the world around us - instead of being formed by Christ. Comer offers three goals for us in becoming apprentices to Christ: 1) Be with Jesus, 2) Be like him, and 3) Do as he did. We will discuss the various practices that Comer believes are necessary to not just be a "Christian", but to be a true disciple or apprentice to Christ. Copies of the book will be available before the class starts.



Dunham Hall Class: Wonderfully Made

Our Christian identity tells us that we are children of God, created on purpose, and blessed as good. To live fully into that identity, we are called to practice being good stewards of our minds, bodies, and spirits, and to share that health and wholeness with the world. Toward this end, the Mental Health Task Force has curated a 5-week education block representing a wide variety of topics, each relating to an issue that causes anxiety, confusion, isolation, grief, shame, or fear. Local experts with professional insight will guide us through each 1-hour long session, including time for questions and resource recommendations. The aim of each and all of these sessions is for us to face dynamic, difficult subject matter with each other, our shared faith, honesty, and hope in the good news of the Gospel. Summer Sabbatical Preview

Why Sabbatical?

This summer marks five years since we welcomed Meg and Jarrett to UPC. In some respects, their time with us has flown by, but when we look back at those five years, we are reminded that they were five very full years! Within six months of arriving at UPC, a global pandemic forced the McLaughlins to completely reimagine worship, fellowship, and outreach. Thanks to their creativity, determination, and leadership, UPC not only survived that difficult period but thrived. Over the past five years they have also challenged and inspired us from the pulpit, tended to our needs in joy and sorrow, welcomed scores of new members, provided opportunities for engagement with the world outside of our walls, expanded and mentored our staff, and cared for our beautiful but aging facilities.

This summer, our co-pastors will have the opportunity to take well-earned sabbaticals. UPC offers a sabbatical to full-time program staff after every five years of service. The purpose of the sabbatical is to provide time for extended study, renewal, and professional growth. Sabbaticals are good for our staff and they are good for the church! You will be hearing more from Meg and Jarrett about their staggered sabbaticals, including plans for covering their responsibilities while they are gone.

To recognize longevity, it has been this congregation's practice to collect monetary love gifts for staff ahead of their second sabbatical, after ten years of service. The Personnel Committee recommended to the Session that we make a one-time exception to that practice and allow the congregation to collect a love gift for the McLaughlins for this sabbatical, in gratitude for their extraordinary service to the church. When will Meg and Jarrett be on sabbatical?

Meg's sabbatical will be May 20-Aug. 12, and Jarrett's sabbatical will be June 14-Sept. 6. Both Co-Pastors will be away for 12 weeks, with 8 overlapping weeks (Sundays include June 16 through August 11).



What are their plans?

Meg will start her time away with a clergy women's retreat with a beloved therapist who does work in the enneagram and internal family systems. And Jarrett hopes to travel up the East Coast to connect with friends and hike.

The expected highlight of the summer will be a two-week trip to Costa Rica (where their daughters are hoping to see a sloth!). Meg and Jarrett have coordinated with Karla Koll, the PC(USA) Mission Co-Worker whom UPC has supported for years, to explore what global mission opportunities might be possible.

They also hope to read, reflect, and reconnect, but mostly practice holy rest and remembering.

What does this mean for UPC?

We will continue to worship, fellowship, serve, and be the church together! Duties for pastoral care, worship, and administration will be divided among the associate pastors.
