*Director of Music Search - Here's a brief update about where we are!

UPC has received 28 applications for our Director of Music Position. We are asking things like: *How would you articulate the role of music in worship? and your role in the room? Summer Sabbatical Plans

UPC offers a sabbatical to full-time program staff after every five years of service. The purpose of the sabbatical is to provide time for extended study, renewal, and professional growth. Sabbaticals are good for our staff and they are good for the church!

This summer, Meg and Jarrett will be taking staggered sabbaticals, allowing each of them to have some independent sabbatical time and some combined sabbatical time.

Meg's sabbatical: May 20-Aug. 11 Jarrett's sabbatical: June 14-Sept. 5 Overlapping weeks: June 14-Aug. 11 (overlapping Sundays are June 16 through Aug. 11).



What are appropriate sabbatical boundaries?

During their respective sabbaticals, Meg and Jarrett will be unplugging from UPC life. Sabbatical is meant to allow rest and restoration, and completely stepping away from church life for that period is an important part of that process.

Sabbatical Boundary FAQ:

Will Meg and Jarrett attend worship or church events? No, Meg and Jarrett (and their family) will not be in worship during their sabbatical times.

What about funerals?

Meg and Jarrett will not come back from sabbatical to lead any funerals. We are fortunate to have three gifted Associate Pastors (Hadley, Nancy, and Berry) who are equipped to walk alongside grieving families and plan and lead funerals.

Can I call/email them?

Meg and Jarrett's auto-response on their email and phone will say that they are away and that they will not go back through three months of emails or voicemails. If you send them something that you want them to see, send it again upon their return.

What if I see them at the pool/grocery store/some other place?

It's okay to say hi and talk about family/school/life! Please don't pretend you don't see them.

What does this mean for UPC?

We will continue to worship, fellowship, serve, and be the church together! Duties will be divided among the associate pastors:

- Hadley Kifner: pastoral care
- Nancy Myer: administration and personnel
- Berry French: worship

Hadley, Nancy, and Berry will also preach this summer, in addition to several guest preachers (details on the next page)

Community assistance on Tuesdays will be paused while Jarrett is on Sabbatical.








High School Youth Sabbath Retreat

Stephen Ministry: Love Embodied

After a recent worship service, a congregant came up and said, "Stephen Ministry caregivers are love embodied." We pray that this statement is true, for this is what trained Stephen Ministers aim to be in the midst of our congregation and community.

Stephen Ministry-trained caregivers are matched with people in our church family who are in need of a spiritual companion, some encouragement, a non-judgemental presence. Individuals who feel overwhelmed by a family situation, or are facing a particularly challenging dynamic at work may benefit from receiving care from a Stephen Minister. Those who are sad or lonely, heartbroken or anxious, uncertain or afraid may also benefit.

During each visit, caregivers work hard to show up with a presence of grace and love. Intentional about their role in relation to the care receiver, they listen. They bear witness to. They abide with. With Jesus as the model, Stephen Ministers really do try to serve as love embodied.



On April 7, four trainees and one new supervisory leader were blessed and installed as the newest members of this congregational ministry. During that service, they promised to love, listen, and serve - and you promised to speak up when you needed to be loved, listened to, served compassionately. Star Word Reflection

Many of us donned special sunglasses and glanced up at the sky in the early afternoon on April 8 to see the solar eclipse. During a solar eclipse, the moon passes in between the Earth and the Sun, blocking the sun's light for just a few moments. During these sacred, hauntingly beautiful silent seconds, the sky darkens as if it is nighttime. PCM's trip to Costa Rica

For those of us who are a little more removed from our college days, we may have trouble remembering just how involved going to a university can be. Academics, jobs, living situation, meals, friend groups, hobbies, spiritual community- most realms of life pertain somehow to our role as a student. An academic institution (especially a bigger one like UNC) can become its own all-encompassing world. Given this, I hope you can appreciate what a treat it was to take a group of PCM students outside of the UNC bubble- not just outside of Chapel Hill, but outside of our country and culture entirely!

Early in the morning of March 8, nine students (accompanied by Berry and myself) piled into a church van and headed to Charlotte, where we caught a flight to San José, Costa Rica.



We spent the next week or so traveling this beautiful country, learning new things, trying new foods, having new experiences, and generally immersing ourselves in the exhilarating discomfort of international travel.

We were able to spend much of our time in various agro-eco tourism activities. We stayed at a number of fincas (small-time rural farms), learning how various native plants could be used for everything from building to food to soap to firestarters. Many of these fincas were owned by indigenous women, who work together in cooperatives that can sustain their communities in a self-sufficient way. We were welcomed under our hosts' roofs, around their tables, and into their culture. We learned how the pineapple industry (driven largely by US demand) is devastating the local environment and economy– and that this was only the tip of the iceberg in terms of how we are invisibly connected to our siblings the world over. We enjoyed the beauty of Costa Rica's natural resources, swimming in the ocean, oohing and aahing over a veritable ark of sloths, monkeys, frogs, spiders, and snakes.

Of course, none of this would have been possible without the generosity of a dear friend who's already known to the UPC community: Karla Koll, who partners with UPC through the Presbyterian Mission Agency and has served in Latin America for decades of faithful service. Without Karla's relationships and leadership (not to mention Spanish skills), the trip would not have been nearly as thoughtful, fruitful, or ethically responsible– and parts of it simply wouldn't have happened at all. The setting and faculty of the Latin American Biblical University (the San José seminary where Karla works as a professor) were likewise invaluable in giving us the tools to productively frame and process the whirlwind of a week we shared.



This brings me to our additional mission partner: you. Through your direct support of PCM, through UPC's partnership with missionary workers like Karla, through the myriad ways you demonstrate what it means to be the hands and feet of Christ in the world, the life and mission of University Presbyterian Church was a large part of what made this trip possible. It is easy to affirm the connectional nature of the global Church with such partners– thank you!

Endowment Report

The UPC Endowment Committee recommended three spring grants which the UPC Session approved at its April meeting. The grants are as follows:

- Family Health Ministries: up to \$10,000 toward construction of a new surgical suite in Haiti
- Union Presbyterian Seminary, Charlotte Campus: \$10,000 to help endow a new Vice President for Administration
- UPC Elder Retreat: \$6,000 to support a pilot oneday retreat in January 2025 at the Summit Center in Brown's Summit, NC. In future years, the intent is for this to be funded through the annual budget.

In addition, the Endowment Committee will disburse two additional grants based on multi-year commitments:

- Massanetta Springs: \$10,000 of a \$35,000 commitment over 4 years to help build a new hotel on their property (final payment in 2026)
- Habitat for Humanity: \$10,000 of a \$30,000 commitment over 3 years to help fund a Community Center in Weaver's Grove (final payment in 2025)

Actual amount gifted so far in 2024: \$46,000



In late April, UPC hosted a new clergy cohort, modeled after Meg and Jarrett's group, "The Well" (which was modeled after Bob Dunham's group, "The Moveable Feast"). The funding for their first meeting came from a 2023 Endowment Grant. Thank you, Endowment Committee, for investing in PC(USA) ministers!
