Pastor's Message



"I stopped teaching Sunday School for a few years, but one year, it got to me - I saw a class of Confirmation students stand up on the steps, and I didn't know them, so I had to go back to teaching."

Shannon Pace is a deeply committed Sunday School teacher currently working with the 3rd and 4th grade class. I recently saw her in the hallway on a Monday morning getting prepared for the next Sunday's class...let me repeat that. I saw her preparing for Sunday School ON A MONDAY MORNING. Our publication schedule requires that the preacher-of-the-week submit a worship bulletin by Tuesday. I haven't even begun to think about it yet, and Shannon has already planned and prepped for her 8 and 9-year-old pupils.

I was filled with gratitude for Shannon and so many others who commit themselves to the ministry of faith formation. The joy she takes in welcoming a new batch of children is equal to the pride she felt in worship as a class of 8th-grade Confirmation students were commissioned for their year of exploration. "I taught so many of them," she said with a huge smile on her face.

It was a brief interaction in the hallway, but it initiated something of a stream-of-consciousness prayer of gratitude within me. I got to thinking about our childcare workers - some who are seasonal college students, others who have been with us for years - and I gave thanks for how they are among the first to create a soothing space of welcome (even through tears and separation anxiety) for our littlest ones.

I gave thanks for those who sing with preschoolers and creatively tell Bible stories, which then made me think about our Godly Play volunteers who greet our 4 and 5-year-olds with a blessing and share a story told with the contents of a box decorated to remind us how precious Scripture can be for helping us understand ourselves and God.

I gave thanks for middle school teachers who discuss the Bible over bagels or donuts and high school teachers who wander down to Suttons for the same with our older students. I pictured the Confirmation team who faithfully organize a series of lessons that walk our 8th graders through the basics of what it means to be a Christian and a Presbyterian so they might make a decision at the end of the year to confirm that faith. I thought about Brian Meacham who painstakingly selects theme music for each lesson so the youth get to guess what they'll be exploring that day.

My mind then settled on where Shannon left me – with the Confirmation students standing on the steps yesterday receiving the congregation's blessing, but ALSO the mentors who stood behind them. Some of those pairs have known each other for years. Others will just be getting to know one another in the coming weeks. ALL of them have an opportunity to be a crucial part of their mentee's faith journey, and so I said "thank you" for those who have ever said yes to that calling and who are saying it now.

During their commissioning in worship, Tristan Wall used a line that is worth repeating. He said: "This year is not about conforming your faith to a pre-determined mold. This is about confirming your faith as your own." I recognized some variation of the line from when we interviewed him not even 18 months ago. It struck me then and strikes me now that all of our faithformation ministry is in service to that goal. In the end, we do not seek to create automatons with rote answers to every question about God. We seek to empower disciples of Jesus Christ to take up a living, active faith filled with struggle and grace and redemption.

With the recent storms and the unfolding scope of the damage right in our backyard, Lord knows we have had occasion for some serious questions about the nature of God. What a gift it is to have a community where we can wrestle with those questions together. If you are now or have ever participated in any of our spiritual growth offerings – whether as a student or teacher – I give thanks for you. May we always be on the way to confirming a faith that is never conformed to the world as it is South but always in search of God's promised day where all that is wrong is made right.

Sunday Morning Fire Alarm: An Update

If you were in worship on Sept. 15, you left without a benediction; instead, we had an emergency evacuation. The strobes and sounds of the fire alarm were jarring, and we want to acknowledge, especially in this nation where we live, that such experiences are scary. Our minds race to the worst possible scenario.

First and foremost, we are grateful that no one was hurt and that no damage was done to our church home.

We are thankful:

- for systems that alert us when something is wrong;
- for Martha, the nursery worker who pulled the alarm;
- for the Chapel Hill Fire Department, who responded immediately;
- for the Godly play volunteers and other childcare staff who moved our children swiftly to safety;
- for you, the congregation, for your calm exit from the building.

We are also grateful for the opportunity to learn from this experience. It's not often you "get" to practice a full-scale fire drill on a Sunday morning. We're grateful for those who are helping us review our policies and for a thoughtful process to ensure that those policies are well communicated.

We are grateful for the leadership of this church, who, over the past year, have been thinking about the very boring but absolutely necessary work needed for this physical plant, this building, which is our launching pad for ministry.

Recently, the Session approved hiring a consulting firm (Armstrong McGuire) to help us with a feasibility study to determine the capacity of what this congregation can tackle- a full decade after the end of our last campaign.

On the potential list of projects is an overhaul of our HVAC system, including the air handling units. This was the source of the fire: a decades-old condensation pump burned up. Our staff is carefully eyeing the other pumps, and there is NO reason to fear, but we would be remiss not to proactively act as good stewards of this space.

We are grateful for the utter privilege of being able to look back and laugh at a sermon about a burning bush, followed by a FIRE alarm, but we are mostly grateful for the encounters we have with Almighty God, which remind us we are indeed on holy ground.

For generations, UPC has been there—a steady presence—in this community proclaiming and living out God's love in Christ. Even when the world around us is topsy-turvy and much of our culture is bent on division, UPC equips us to stay rooted in the gospel. Our 2025 pledge goal is \$2.15 million, a 6% increase from 2024. This increase accounts for inflation and modest building/programmatic increases, while also maintaining our commitment to staff and outreach.

Responding to the impact of Hurricane Helene in NC

It was not long ago that this church stood in the waters of Flat Creek, which flows into the Swannanoa River, winding through Buncombe County. We stood there, ankle deep, to baptize in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Water reminds us of the promise that we belong to God, in life and in death.

When that same water rages, floods and destroys, our hearts break. This natural disaster hits close to home. We love Montreat and many of us have dear ones who call WNC home.

Your staff has been discerning how to balance the help we want to offer with the help that is wanted on the ground right now. The last thing we want to do is place additional burdens on an already taxed relief effort. The consistent word from our connections is to not come yet, but to send financial support and to stand at the ready; thus we commend the following to you as a way to respond:

Give: The Presbyterian Church is connectional. UPC has trusted relationships in the area that need support now and in the long haul. Gifts to the UPC "WNC Disaster Relief" fund will be pooled and then disbursed to vetted organizations on the ground offering relief. You can give online or via check (be sure to designate your gift to the "WNC Disaster Relief" fund).

Stand by to go: Several of our members have been in conversation about organizing a trip to offer practical, physical help. The timing of that trip may be weeks or months from now, depending on how long it takes for basic infrastructure to be repaired. If you are interested in participating in a future trip, visit upcch.org/disaster-relief to share your interest, and we will be in touch once plans start to form.

PCM Fall Retreat Report



Beach retreat, which is always our first major PCM event of the academic year, is an exciting time. We load 38(!) students into a bunch of cars and take over three houses in Ocean Isle for a weekend- there's time in the surf and sand (beach kickball was a highlight for me), good food and conversation shared over crowded tables, and plenty of laughter. We take the time to be together in worship, too, and to appreciate the ways that God is moving in nature and the relationships we share.

As a staff member, it's always an exciting opportunity to sit back and watch the students interact, to watch the acts of generosity and hospitality and love that have become a hallmark of this ministry. For example, five students led the charge to make sure everyone was fed. One student took charge of programming, provoking periods of contemplation and worship. So many students showed up with vulnerability and courage to "brieology," the tradition of gathering around



baked brie and wrestling with difficult theological questions together. The weekend was brimming with countless casual moments of caring and community in the walks on the beach, in the late-night games, in things as simple as an invitation to sit with a group of friends...moments that redouble my gratitude to God for all that PCM is and is becoming.

The thing most precious to me, though, is getting to see PCM decide who it wants to be for the year. Watching students gel, seeing the bond between them form and solidify, looking on as returning students set a tone and a culture that borrows generously from both their own holy imaginations and the loving examples of students who have graduated, bearing witness to new students seeing for the first time the magic that I get a front row seat to every week...it's such an incredible gift, to see the Spirit moving in real time. And moving, she was- and she has not stopped since.

I'll tell anyone who cares to listen: the ministry of PCM is an incredible gift to so many folks. That happy fact doesn't happen by accident – it happens because of thoughtful collaboration with partners like University Presbyterian Church, students who are dedicated to pursuing God's will through beloved community, and moments like beach retreat, where we are afforded the opportunity to step out of the relentless current of everyday life and make space for something holy to spark.



NexTrex Challenge - What Not to Include

We are grateful for all who are helping care for God's creation by participating in UPC's NexTrex Plastic Bag and Film Recycling Challenge! The ability to recycle rather than send to the landfill these ubiquitous soft plastics that have become a huge environmental problem feels like a God-send.

However, far too many items that NexTrex will NOT accept are being put into UPC's three NexTrex bins. Of the first 60 pounds UPC collected, over 10 pounds had to be removed by hand and thrown away. Included were several of nearly every item on NexTrex's "DO NOT INCLUDE" list (below and on each collection bin), as well as many items failing the "stretch" and "shiny/crinkly/crunchy" tests. Please carefully review NexTrex's instructions for what it can and cannot recycle.



What NOT to include:

Any plastic bag that you cannot stretch or push your thumbs through should NOT be put into the NexTrex bins. This includes frozen food bags, and other thick, non-stretchable plastic bags and pouches containing cheese, meat, nuts, granola, pre-washed salads, other vegetables and fruit, etc.

Other items that had to be separated out and discarded:

- rigid plastic clamshells, food trays, plates, cups, cup lids, and straws
- bird and grass seed bags
- soil and fertilizer bags
- bread, cereal, and sandwich bags, and other bags still containing food. (Turn inside out and shake food into your compost bin or trash.)
- wet items (esp. ice and sandwich bags. Turn inside out and let dry completely)
- dirty or greasy items
- paper, cardboard, receipts, bakery bags, etc.
- prescription pill bottles
- medical waste "biohazard" bags
- metal clamps, such as on ice bags
- compostable bags, cups, etc.
- Mylar balloons



Please note that any dirty, wet or food-containing items not only must be separated and thrown away, but also may contaminate otherwise acceptable items in collection bins that must then also be thrown away.



What you CAN include:

- grocery and shopping bags (clean, dry, and empty)
- bread, sandwich, and cereal bags (clean with no food or organic residue/crumbs)
- dry cleaning bags, newspaper sleeves, ice bags (clean and dry)
- bubble wrap and plastic shipping envelopes (cut off any labels or metallic Mylar strips)
- plastic case overwrap around paper towels, bottled water, etc.

Not sure if your plastic qualifies? Try these two tests:

Does it **stretch** when you pull it? If yes, it can be included. If it tears like paper, then please don't put in the bin.

Is the package **shiny** or does it make a crinkly/crunchy sound in your hand? If yes, do NOT recycle in the NexTrex bin.
