Pastor's Message



Dear Friends,

This is a note of gratitude to you, the University Presbyterian Church family, for participating in our feasibility study. University Presbyterian Church is made up of approximately 612 households, and 247 of them provided input to our campaign consultants, who aggregated the data to help us discern the size and scope of a possible campaign. That's an outstanding response—41%, compared to the typical 30% for churches! **Well done!**

Over the winter, the consultants engaged with 290 members of all ages through: 16 member interviews, 12 focus groups, 2 town halls, 4 staff interviews, and 1 staff focus group. We want to say **thank you** for giving your time, asking your questions, sharing your ideas, naming your hopes, and considering your own investment in what all this may mean.

Based on your spoken priorities and conservative math, the Campaign Readiness Team will bring a recommendation to Session in April. They may choose to reflect on it until May, but I would expect you to hear news of your elders' decision this spring.

What I can tell you now is that the consultants found great vibrancy and health in their work with us.

Here are a few things that stood out in their report (which we can happily share with you after the Session has had a chance to digest it first):

- There is a high degree of trust in the congregation. You have confidence in our strong committee structure and our processes. You can depend on the leadership.
- **There is financial health.** Our giving has increased 25% since 2020 (defying national trends), we have no debt, we have a strong administration committee, an established endowment, and an effective online giving platform.
- While our membership numbers remain steady (about 1,200), we have welcomed an average of 63 new members each year over the past three years, and we maintain very clean membership rolls. **There is high engagement of the congregation** in our common ministry.

If you were at the family meeting in worship a few weeks ago, you may recall my joke that our consultants were shocked at the number of in-depth questions they received. Typically, a "Frequently Asked Questions" document isn't added to the draft case for campaign support until later, once the scope and size of a campaign have been determined. But you, dear ones, are not a typical congregation. You are the kind of congregation that is going to kick every tire! You care deeply and invest fully. And I love you for it.

Please continue to keep the church in prayer as the Session discerns our next steps. And receive our heartfelt thanksgiving for your participation and for being who you are.

Holy Week at UPC



Palm Sunday (April 13, 8:30 & 11:00 am)

On Palm Sunday, we remember the story of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, as the crowd waved palm branches and cried out "Hosanna!" In worship on this day, you'll have the opportunity to wave your own palm branch.



Holy Week Labyrinth (April 14-18)

Mon.-Thurs., 9:30 am-3:30 pm Fri., 9:30 am-12:00 pm

There will be a labyrinth available in Vance Barron Hall during Holy Week week for you to walk and pray. Instructions will be available for this self-guided practice; we advise planning to spend about 30 minutes walking and praying. Please park on the street or in the parking deck, and enter via Henderson St.



Maundy Thursday (April 17, 7:30 pm)

Maundy Thursday is the day during Holy Week that commemorates Jesus' last meal with his disciples, when he washed their feet and gave them the commandment (mandate, where we get the word Maundy) to love one another. Join us in the Sanctuary for a contemplative service, including a meditation from Hadley Kifner, handwashing, and Holy Communion, to reflect on how Jesus proclaimed the gospel through service and love.



Good Friday (April 18, 7:30 pm)

On the Friday of Holy Week, we will worship together in a Service of Tenebrae. Tenebrae is the Latin word meaning darkness. Sometimes we learn things in the dark, in the shadows, that we could have never learned or appreciated in the bright light of day. On Good Friday, we will read the story of Jesus' passion (his suffering and death) and extinguish lights until we leave the sanctuary in complete darkness, awaiting the glorious light of Easter morning. Jarrett McLaughlin will offer the meditation.

We'll worship together at 8:30 and 11:00 am on Easter Sunday. Both services will be in the Sanctuary; only the 11:00 service will be livestreamed. Instead of Sunday School on that day, we will have a potluck brunch.

Western NC: An Update & An Opportunity

In the immediate aftermath of Hurricane Helene's destruction, everyone wanted to know what UPC was going to do. At the time, what we kept hearing from partners was "wait." "Gather financial contributions – there will definitely be a need for them – but right now just hold it."

Today I am happy to report that we have a plan. In addition to \$25,000 that was shared with Grace Covenant Presbyterian Church to bolster their crucial rent assistance program, we now have an opportunity to help rebuild a home for one extremely worthy couple. Meet Ryan and Deena Edwards.

Ryan is a long-time staff person at Camp Grier, a Presbyterian camp nestled in the valley of Old Fort, NC. During the storm, Ryan and Deena lost everything. Their entire home was lifted off its foundation – a total loss. And yet that didn't stop Ryan from showing up to work at Camp Grier, which suddenly became an emergency resource center, offering housing, meals, and showers to displaced persons.



One thing I love about being Presbyterian is that – at our best – we are a connectional Church. Our church here in Chapel Hill shares fellowship with Camp Grier because of that connectional spirit, and that, in turn, connected us to First Presbyterian Church of Charlottesville, Virginia, which is faithfully spearheading a movement to rebuild a home for the Edwards. Leveraging the talents of their own members, First Pres. Charlottesville has designed a 24x40, 960 sq.ft. home to meet the needs of this couple with a budget not to exceed \$250,000. The Edwards are pre-qualified for a loan, but our hope is that between FEMA grants (should they materialize), other local relief agencies, and the generosity of our combined congregations, they will not need to carry a mortgage on the property. This would return them to the modest financial stability they enjoyed prior to Helene.

It gets better! One way this partnership can control costs is through volunteer labor. Ryan's brother is a General Contractor in McDowell County and will head up the project at a much-reduced rate. He will sub-contract the septic systems, foundation, and sub-flooring, but everything else from the floor up could very well be volunteer-driven, and thanks to this connectional Presbyterian church in which we live, UPC has been invited to take part in that aspect of the partnership. As of now, the plan is for groups to work on the site the weeks of May 18-23 and May 25-30. If you would like to participate in constructing Ryan and Deena's home, please be in touch with me (jarrett@upcch.org). There will likely be some expenses but do not let that get in the way of you participating. We have funds to help subsidize church members who wish to volunteer.

Most likely, volunteers will enjoy the hospitality of Camp Grier for room and board and spend the days working on this home, or perhaps other projects in the surrounding area if there are more volunteers than will fit on that work site. All volunteers will have an opportunity to work on the home so that all can share in the experience of giving this deserving couple a home to call their own.

As always, none of this would be possible without the overwhelming generosity that poured out of this congregation in the aftermath of Hurricane Helene. On behalf of the Edwards and countless others benefiting from that generosity in Western North Carolina, thank you – thank you – thank you.

People often ask, "What exactly is a Stephen Minister?" One way to put it is that Stephen Ministers are the After People.

Stephen Ministers are there:

- ... after the phone call you hoped you'd never get.
- ... after the divorce papers are served and the bottom falls out of your life.
- ... after the funeral, when everyone has left and the emotions you've held at bay come crashing in on you.
- ...after the doctor says, "I'm sorry, but there's nothing more we can do."
- ...after the retirement community director shakes your hand and says, "Welcome to your new home."
- ...after the last child honks the horn, waves, and drives away and the house suddenly seems empty.
- ... after the gavel goes down, the handcuffs go on, and your loved one is led away.
- ... after the baby arrives, demanding more of you than you ever dreamed possible.
- ... after you find a pink slip with your final paycheck.
- ... after your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but you still need to talk it out.

Stephen Ministers are the "After People." They are ready to come alongside you - or your friends, neighbors, coworkers, or relatives - and provide comfort and support for as long after as needed.



UPPS


God is love—and so is UPPS (University Presbyterian Pre-School).

It's not just one person who loves the children at our preschool; it's all of the UPPS staff who lovingly care for every child in the program. UPPS generates a culture of nurturing and acceptance and is a safe space, and our scholarship fund makes the program accessible for all children.

One child has been in the program for three years. When they arrived from another country as a two-year-old, they were overwhelmed by the new environment and new people and spoke very few words. By the second year, they became more comfortable within this safe and loving environment, but they still didn't speak much. The student is now in a four-year-old class and speaks confidently with teachers and new friends in the classroom, knowing they're accepted and loved. If you could see this young child eagerly waving goodbye from the car window every day after school, you would know that UPPS has made such a difference in their life, thanks to the loving care from teachers.
